Caught in the debate over reparations

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Jul 29 2013 (IPS) - As Caribbean countries prepare to observe Emancipation Day on Aug. 1, they are also caught up in an ongoing debate over reparations for slavery. St. Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves, who has stated publicly that he will "take no quarter on those issues", told IPS, "We have in my view a very strong case to put to an appropriate tribunal." Last week, as he addressed an audience in Cuba marking the 60th anniversary of the attack on the Moncada Barracks that launched the 1953 Revolution, Gonsalves said the Caribbean is Continued on Page 4 WINS big in Indian Territory

A very politically interesting thing happened in Trinidad on Monday night when Afro businessman and former National Security Minister Austin Jack Warner took on the Hindu-dominated, governing People's Partnership (PP) in an Indian heartland constituency and won, triggering fears about his alleged larger ambitions to either severely weaken the governing coalition or bring it down altogether.

Until late April when Warner,

70, resigned his parliamentary seat in Chaguanas West, gave up the chairmanship of the United National Congress (UNC) and quit as national security minister in the wake of an international corruption scandal, he had been the most powerful person in the cabinet of Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar.

He had also been the man who had put together the PP and was one of its main financiers, draw-

Antigua

A 73-year-old Italian national charged with murdering his 72-year-old ex-wife is to re-appear in court here this month.

Police said that Umberto Schenato, who appeared before Chief Magistrate

Joanne Walsh, stabbed his estranged wife, Edda Schenato to death in the park-

ing lot of a supermarket recently.

He was not asked to plead and the committal proceedings will determine whether or not the matter will go to trial in the High Court.

Schenato, who was remanded into custody, was told that he could apply for bail before a High Court judge.

Bahamas

Crime in the Bahamas dropped seven percent nationally between Jan. 1, 2013 and July 16, 2013 compared to the same period last year, according to figures released yesterday by Commissioner of Police Ellison Greenslade.

In New Providence, crimes against the person increased by four percent. Not all crimes are available in the statistical report.

In major crime categories nationally, 6,133

crimes were reported during this last year. This compares to 5,726 crimes reported this year.

Murder decreased by 21 percent (from 73 to 58) attempted murder decreased by 62 percent (from 13 to five) rape decreased by two percent (from 58 to 57) and attempted rape increased by 117 percent (from six to 13).

Police also recorded an increase in armed robberies is significant as that has been an area of concern for many years. While armed robberies decreased nationwide. in New Providence specifically it actually increased by five percent. There were 519 cases in 2012 compared to 543 cases recorded so far this year.

Police have recorded a reduction in the number of attempted murders in New Providence. Murders decreased by 11 percent (from 62 to 55) and attempted murders decreased by 75 percent (from 12 to three). Nationally, property

crimes decreased overall by seven percent.

Shop breaking increased by three percent while stealing increased by two percent. Burglary cases deceased by six percent; housebreaking matters decreased by 21 percent; stealing from vehicle by three percent and stolen vehicles by five percent.

Guyana

A joint meeting with senior management of the Guvana Police Force (GPF), together with its policy analysts as well the Crime and Social Observatory, it was emphasised that the police will win or lose the battle against crime,

particularly in 'A' Division, of which Georgetown is part.

In a press statement the presen-

tation, which was evidence-based, pointed to certain 'hot spots' in the city and other areas where crime can be anticipated and, from an operational perspective, the police should deploy its ranks and moveable assets to effectively deal with those specific areas fraught with potential criminal threats.

It noted that, at the end of the presentation, there could not have been a clearer message to the hierarchy of the GPF, especially to the acting commissioner, deputy commissioner (Law Enforcement), assistant commissioner (Operations) and the commanders of all divisions.

The statement said the Acting Commissioner has been requested, by the ministry, to adopt the appropriate operational posture to conform with the conclusions in the presentation with which all had agreed.

Further, the acting commissioner, with the support of the deputy commissioner (Law Enforcement), assistant commissioner (Operations) and, particularly commander 'A' Division, have been advised to inform the general public about actions contemplated by police to bring the situation under control, once again, the ministry said.

Jamaica

Jamaica could get assistance from Cuba to enhance its canine capability to combat illicit drug trafficking and the illicit arms trade. The National Security Ministry says it is one of the areas for improvement being looked at as the countries explore possible renewal of their Maritime and Police Coopera-

tion Agreements. National Securitv Minister, Peter Bunting



recently returned from a threeday official visit to Cuba where he met with top security officials to explore the possible renewal of the agreements which expire in September 2013. The agreements speak to efforts by the countries to address the illicit trade in small arms and drugs, and trafficking in other forms.

St. Kitts

The seven Opposition parliamentarians have once again boycotted a session of National Assembly citing

their refusal to "legitimize the proceedings." The National

Assembly convened recently with only the eight government parliamentarians. Last Monday the Opposition members turned up to a sitting of the Assembly but

left prematurely after the Speaker of the House. Curtis Martin declared he would hear no discussions relating to the Motion of No Confidence (MoNC) as the matter was still before the court.

Federal Opposition Leader Hon. Mark Brantley told The Observer he wrote to the Speaker recently inquiring if the Motion would be debated.

Martin said that the Opposition MPs had withdrawn the court case and thus there was no MoNC matter before the court brought by them.

Former government minister turned Opposition MP, Dr. Timothy Harris explained that his colleagues did not and would not participate in parliamentary proceedings as long as the "legitimate minority government of Dr. Denzil Douglas" and Speaker Martin "collude and refuse to bring the Motion of No Confidence to be heard for over seven months".

St. Lucia

Recently, the inaugural flight of United Airlines touched down at Hewanorra International Airport, Vieux Fort from Newark International in the U.S.


The flight was greeted with the ceremonial water salute by the Saint Lucia Fire

Hurricane Sandy rebuilding plan

Wednesday July 31, a procession of New Yorkers, accompanied by music and visuals capturing the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, marched from the Staten Island Ferry Terminal to City Hall to release a plan on post-Sandy rebuilding for the mayoral candidates to adopt.

The Alliance for a Just Rebuilding (AJR), a coalition of Sandy-impacted New Yorkers, labor unions, and community, faith, environmental and policy organizations, released a major new rebuilding plan developed by people working and living the communities hit the hardest by Sandy.

Key decisions on post-Sandy rebuilding will be made by Bloomberg's successor, and many AJR member groups and organizations today called on the mayoral candidates vying to succeed Bloomberg to make specific commitments to good jobs, affordable housing, sustainable energy, and community engagement to ensure an equitable rebuilding of our city.

The post-Sandy rebuilding plan, Turning the Tide: How Our Next Mayor Should Tackle Sandy Rebuilding, focuses on the fact that Sandy exposed deep inequities that existed long before the howling winds and flooding bore down on the city last fall, and reveals that our next mayor's legacy will be defined by whether those inequities are transformed or neglected.

"Making New York stronger and more resilient for all, and especially for the most vulnerable, is the single most important challenge facing our next mayor. This platform briefly lays out some concrete and realistic steps that Bloomberg's successor can employ...to redress and reduce the inequities that faced our city long before Hurricane Sandy," the AJR rebuilding plansays.

The plan lays out a fourpoint agenda for turning the tide away from inequality toward justice:

1. Our Next Mayor

Should Ensure That Sandy Recovery And Rebuilding Dollars Create Thousands Of Good Local Jobs.

2. Our Next Mayor Should Restore Lost Affordable Housing, and Create New Affordable Housing for Displaced Residents to Preserve Community Ties

3. Our Next Mayor Should Invest in Clean, Sustainable Energy Infrastructure that Values Communities and is Accountable to the Public.

4. Our Next Mayor Should Include and Engage Communities in Sandy Recovery – and in Planning NYC's Future.

Policy recommendations and proposals for each of the four areas are as follows:.

"Those who were struggling the most before Sandy are still suffering the most in the recovery. For New Yorkers to fully recover, 'resiliency' must come in the form of good jobs, job training programs, and real affordable housing. Economic development in post-Sandy New York must lift all boats, not only the yachts of the real estate industry," Pastor David Rommereim of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and a leader of Faith in New York.

"Hurricane Sandy left devastation and innumerable tragedies in its wake, but with rebuilding comes hope and opportunity. We can make our communities stronger. As we rebuild, the City must ensure that new housing is storm-secure and affordable to those who were displaced, and that the jobs created by the rebuilding allow our neighbors who were affected to lift themselves up with safe work at a family-sustaining wage," said Kyle Bragg, Secretary-Treasurer, 32BJ SEIU

Vincy-Canada picinic a blast

Heavy thundershowers and a tornado watch overnight and early morning on July 20 gave way to a lovely, sunny Saturday, as thousands descended on Brown's Bay Park on the shores of the St. Lawrence River in Western Ontario, Canada for the annual Vincy Unity Picnic.

Bad review for New York City EMS

The union representing 9-1-1 operators and EMS dispatchers urges the U.S. Dept. of Homeland Security to investigate the emergency system, calling recent failures a "threat to public safety."

Lillian Roberts, executibve director of District Council 37 AFSCME, the city's largest public employee union, has called on the federal Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to investigate the New York City 9-1-1 emergency response system, citing recent failures and the fact that the \$2 billion system was funded, in part, by federal dollars.

Roberts said the present status of the 9-1-1 system upgrade, including "massive cost overruns, waste and allegations of fraud, serious operational issues and significant understaffing – poses a serious threat to public safety and is a significant drain on much-needed public resources," Roberts said, noting that shortly after the new system went on line, following a recent \$88 million upgrade, it began experiencing glitches and operational failures. Roberts said the 9-1-1

Roberts said the 9-1-1 operators "were forced to record emergency information by hand on slips of paper in order for runners to

race through the emergency call center's vast Brooklyn headquarters to deliver them to dispatchers charged with alerting the appropriate response team."

To date, there have been

three New York City Council hearings on the 9-1-1 system breakdowns, Roberts noted, but added that the city has not taken steps to correct the system's failures.

New York City Controller John Liu found, in a recent audit, that Mayor Bloomberg's project to upgrade the system was seven years behind schedule and \$1 billion over budget, with only one component of the system upgrade was presently up and running. Liu also indicted that the City's emergency 9-1-1 program was significantly impacted by the contractors' delays in meeting their contractual obli-

Continued from cover ing millions from his personal wealth to swing it into power. All this has gone with the political wind that blew through Central Trinidad late Monday.

But that all changed when the prime minister said in late April that she had no choice but to boot him from her cabinet as investigative reports about his international financial dealings as a former vice-president for FIFA, the world governing body for soccer, had become too pervasive for her to ignore.

So Warner decided to resign and then campaign afresh for his seat in Chaguanas West in Central Trinidad, a district where the UNC, the largest of the coalition partners, has traditionally won hands down, being 80 percent Indo Trinidadian.

Warner won about 70 percent of the vote, whipping the coalition's candidate

by more than a two-to-one margin and in so doing, has exposed the soft underbelly of a grouping facing credible and widespread allegations of corruption, nepotism and political arrogance.

Now, just hours after his resounding victory and the fact that he would be going into the 41-seat parliament with his newly minted Independent Liberal Party (ILP), have laid bare uncertainties about the future of the coalition, possible defections to Warner and how tough it would be for the PP to rallyout untill general elections in 2015.

This is so because of lingering fears that some of the prime minister's legislators and cabinet members might defect to Warner's ILP, eventually forming a grouping that could severely undermine her as the Express newspaper reported this week.

Two coalition members, Rodger Samuel and Winston

"Gypsy" Peters have already publicly signaled as such on Wednesday.

Of the two, Peters was a bit clearer, saving that, "I don't know what would happen tomorrow or the day after. I am a member of the UNC now. That's what I am. And I am a loyal member of the UNC right now. But one never knows. Politics is a very fluid thing. One could never tell. One never knows what would happen in the future." he said.

For his part, Samuels noted that he plans to tell the PM first that he is likely to leave shortly.

Continued from cover demanding reparations from Europe for native genocide and African slavery.

'The principal reason for underdevelopment in the Caribbean and Latin America is the legacy of native genocide and African slavery, and we do so with the spirit and with the examples, in this new period, of the combatants of Moncada," he said.

At the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) summit here earlier this month, Gonsalves presented his fellow leaders with three position papers, including one by Professor Hilary Beckles, the pro-vice Chancellor of the University of the West Indies, who recently published the book "Britain's Black Debt: Reparations owed the Caribbean for Slavery and Indigenous Genocide".

Gonsalves is pushing for a common position on reparations and has welcomed the decision to establish a committee under the chairmanship of the Barbados

Prime Minister Freundel Stuart to drive the issue. The committee, which

will oversee the work of a CARICOM Reparations Commission, will include Trinidad and Tobago, Guyana, Haiti, St. Vincent and the Grenadines and Suriname, the chairs of national reparations committees, and a representative of the University of the West Indies.

Kafra Kambon, chair of the Emancipation Support Committee in Trinidad and Tobago, told IPS it is important for non-governmental organisations and the Caribbean population in general to support the initiatives of regional governments.

Kambon, whose grouping organises the annual Emancipation Day activities here, said that the support is necessary since he believes "European governments are going to try to corral them [Caribbean leaders] or even pressure them to abandon the idea. "We have to give the strength to that call for reparations as a principle," Kambon told IPS, calling the slave trade "massive crimes that go beyond the human imagination".

"People have been damaged psychologically, we came out of slavery suffering extreme trauma," he said.

"We were not behind Europe at the time of the contact and some people think of slavery as a rescue mission. It was not," he said, adding that "slavery represents a generation of people that have been wiped out".

In the Dutch country of Suriname, the National Reparations Committee said it would seek consensus and awareness for the correct version of history.

"We're going to bring this dead information about reparations for slavery and about the genocide of our country's first inhabitants to life," said the committee's chair, Armand Zunder, who has applauded the move by CARICOM.

gations, resulting in a \$362 million additional cost to the city.

"The overall cost of the glitch-ridden system," Roberts added, "has soared from \$1.4 billion to more than \$2 billion, and chronic understaffing under the Bloomberg administration nearly doubled annual overtime expenses since 2008 to \$4 million, with this year's tab expected to hit \$4.5 million."

Roberts' letter to DHS insists that the Bloomberg administration has "created a serious threat to public safety and wasted millions of dollars by contracting out the project to firms with questionable performance records, such as Intergraph Corp. which has been implicated in breakdowns of similar systems in San Jose, California and Nassau County."

Haiti faces 'endemic cholera' for years

PORT-AU-PRINCE, July 26 2013 (Haiti Grassroots Watch) - Lack of financing for a 10-year eradication plan means that cholera will likely be endemic to Haiti for years to come.

Cholera spreads via contaminated food, water and fecal matter. One of the essential parts of the government's 2.2-billiondollar National Plan for the Elimination of Cholera in Haiti is financing for sanitation systems nationwide.

The majority of Haitians about eight million out of the country's 10 million people – do not have access to a hygienic sanitation system. They defecate in the open, in fields, in ravines and on riverbanks. The capital region produces over 900 tonnes of human excreta every day, according to the United

Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS).

"Haiti is the only country in the entire world whose sanitation coverage decreased in the last decade," noted Dr. Rishi Rattan, a member of Physicians for Haiti, an association of U.S.based doctors and health professionals.

"Before the cholera outbreak or the earthquake, diarrhea was the number one killer of children under five and the second leading cause of all death in Haiti. Given that cholera is a water-borne illness that relies upon lack of access to clean water, it is highly likely that cholera will become endemic in Haiti without full funding of Haiti's cholera elimination plan by entities such as the United Nations," Rattan told Haiti Grassroots Watch (HGW) in an email.

Cholera, brought to Haiti in October 2010 by soldiers from the United Nations Stabilisation Mission in Haiti (MINUS-

TAH), quickly spread throughout the country. Almost 3,000 are infected each month. To date, over 600,000 people have been infected and at least 8,190 have died.

An Ecological Alternative?

DINEPA is not the only organisation working on the sanitation issue in Haiti. The U.S.-based Sustainable Organic Integrated Livelihoods (SOIL) treats and transforms human excrement into compost that can be used as fertiliser.

SOIL supplies people and

institutions who pay a small monthlyfee with special latrines. Every two weeks, the "Poopmobile" collects the excreta. So far, SOIL says their toilets in operation around the country serve about 10,000 people.

SOIL's compost installation is located at Trutier, north of the capital, not far from one of the two DINEPA waste treatment centres. Three people work there. One empties the Poopmobile drums into the piles that become compost after six months, while the others clean and disinfect the drums so they can be reused.

Haiti police: 183 hurt in fights at **Carnival** fete

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — A summer Carnival-like celebration in Haiti has turned violent.

Haitian police spokesman Gary Desrosiers says 183 people were injured in street fights on the first day of the "Carnival of Flowers."

One man also died when he fell off a float.

Haitian President Michel Martelly revived the "Carnival of Flowers" last year so the capital of Port-au-Prince could have its own Carnival-like party. His administration has moved February's Carnival fete to cities outside the capital in the hopes of developing the countryside.

The "Carnival of Flowers" began Sunday and drew tens of thousands of revelers to downtown Port-au-Prince. Many people painted their faces bright colors and wore flowing costumes as they marched through the streets. The festival ended Tuesday.

Low minimum wage undermines economy

As a business owner who runs a manufacturing company with 150 employees, I strongly support increasing the federal minimum wage, which has been stuck at just \$7.25 an hour since July 24, 2009. It will provide concrete benefits to businesses and will strengthen our overall economy.

Fair wages are part of the formula for success at my company, Spectronics Corporation, the world's leading manufacturer of ultraviolet equipment and fluorescent materials. Raising the minimum wage will help America succeed as well.

Consumer spending drives about 70 percent of our nation's economy. And wages drive consumer spending.

The single biggest problem faced by small businesses today is weak consumer demand. Increasing the minimum wage is a great way to spur economic growth by jump-starting consumer spending. It will allow workers to buy essentials they can't afford now, and most of the money they spend will go right back into local businesses.

That's also good for our tax base.

A higher minimum wage will also result in lower employee turnover. Turnover costs money, and reducing turnover means lower costs for hiring and training new workers. In addition, higher wages bring increased productivity. Employers who invest in their workforce have employees who are more invested in the company and in satisfying its customers.

At my company, nearly 71 percent of employees have been with us for over ten years. Compare that to low-paying chains with continual turnover or the local retail store where one of my daughters worked for a year. She and many of her co-workers were paid minimum wage, and she saw that the biggest problem they faced was high turnover. Much time and effort was spent training the constant flow of new employees, which adversely impacted customer service since they made more mistakes due to their inexperience.

Raising the minimum wage encourages better business practices. An inadequate minimum wage fits the old adage, "Penny wise and pound foolish."

Fortunately, most business owners are already paying employees more than minimum wage. Those companies that do pay their workers poverty wages at or near \$7.25 are in effect being subsidized by other businesses and taxpayers, since lowwage employees are far more likely to turn to government assistance programs to get by. That's simply not fair.

Companies like mine, Costco and In N Out Burger, for example, which thrive with fair wages, show every day that companies Continued on Page 12

Serious concerns about foreclosure practices

We already know that federal regulators have undermined accountability for the "systemic and widespread" abuses by mortgage servicing companies. In another disturbing development, the Federal Reserve and the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) are refusing to turn over information to Members of Congress that could help them prevent such abuses from happening again.

A recent study of the Independent Foreclosure Review (IFR) process by the Government Accountability Office (GAO) cited significant flaws, including a lack of transparency, in the design and implementation of the process. The IFR process was created in 2011 because several mortgage servicing companies and their affiliates were found to have regularly engaged in questionable, unsafe, and even illegal practices. People who lost their homes or were in danger of losing their homes

800,000 people and their families were hurt by the mortgage servicing industry's practices.

through foreclosure in 2009 and 2010 could use the process to ask for an independent review of the action, and could be compensated if the review found they had suffered financial injury due to an error or other problem. Before any payouts were made, though an agreement between federal bank regulators and 13 mortgage service providers ended the IFR review process for all but a handful of these companies.

A few of the serious concerns raised by the GAO are the quality of work done by some of the independent reviewers and the fact payouts are not correlated with the actual amount of financial harm. In addition to raising these issues, the GAO concluded that a lack of transparency about the process undermined confidence in its findings. Despite the GAO's conclusions, however, the Fed and the OCC have decided to double down on the secrecy surrounding the process: refusing requests by Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) and Representative Elijah Cummings (D-MD) for information about the IFR process, and about specific violations of law—including wrongful foreclosures, excessive fees, and fraudulent affidavits filed in court.

During the IFR process, about 800,000 files were identified for review. This is a dry and technical way to say that there was reason to suspect that about 800,000 people and their families were hurt by the mortgage servicing industry's practices. And, as we all know too well, the damage caused by these questionable and illegal actions extends well beyond just the people who lose their home. Foreclosures pull apart communities and can lower property values for the entire neighborhood.

What rural voters want

To the Editor,

Most rural Americans believe the small-town way of life is worth fighting for and support government action to strengthen rural communities.

A poll of rural voters, conducted by the nationally respected bipartisan polling team of Celinda Lake of Lake Research and Ed Goeas of The Tarrance Group, found that rural voters think for themselves and don't neatly fit an ideological stereotype.

Over half said "owning my own business or farm is a big part of the American dream for me," and most agreed with helping small business through cutting taxes, spending and regulation as well as through government loans, tax credits, training and antitrust enforcement. Three-fourths support tax credits and investments in new transmission lines for development of renewable energy generation in rural areas.

Eighty percent of rural voters polled support grants and loans to revitalize small towns through upgrades to water and sewer systems, roads and bridges. The same percentage support job training to improve earnings, Medicaid for health care coverage and other assistance to help the working poor afford necessities of life such the Earned Income Tax Credit. Eighty-five percent favor preschool programs to prepare lower-income children to succeed in school.

Rural voters support cutting farm subsidies to big mega farms to pay for some of these measures, while opposing general cuts in farm subsidies. They oppose across the board tax increases, but favor repealing the Bush tax cuts for those earning over \$250,000.

Warner's trail of wrongdoing can't be ignored

At one time the buzz surrounding contemptible Jack Warner's remaining a member of Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissesar's cabinet in Trinidad and Tobago, despite the abundance of unsavory stuff swirling around him, was that he had "the goods" on Bissessar and her crew, enough so to bring down her government if she cut him loose. The weight of Warner's trail of questionable practices evidently reached critical mass for the prime minister with the release of a special investigator's report earlier this vear on the affairs of CONCACAF. the Caribbean regional football federation, which detailed a pattern of dubious behavior with respect to the federation's finances. Relinquishing, as well, his parliamentary seat and post as chairman of Bissessar's party, the United National Congress (UNC), after he was forced out of the cabinet last April, Warner was presumably fueled by some "I'll show them" propulsion when he indicated he would run again for the seat he resigned, in the process announcing formation of a new party.

We don't consider Warner's winning of that central Trinidad seat, which he just did on Monday, to be quite the ethnic voting bombshell some have suggested. The constituency being predominantly Indo-Trinidadian and thus in the heartland of the UNC's support base, Warner would not have won the seat back in 2010 had he not been aligned with the UNC. He was also, from all we've gathered, determined to be a Johnny-on-the-spot representative in dealing with constituent problems and reportedly spent liberally both from government resources and his own pockets in this regard. Of critical significance, too, in the Warner stratagem, he made a point of conveying a shared ethnic bond with constituents and frequently sported in public certain symbolic manifestations of an alleged conversion to the Hindu faith. Notably, some months ago when thousands took to the streets in protest against probably the most egregious of the current government's many abuses of power (the scandal known as Section 34), then national security minister Warner was constrained to remark derisively that Afro-Trinidadians were the only ones protesting.

Warner, for the three years he was in the Parliament as a UNC member, took pains to craft a very pro-Indo image and one that was at Viewpoint By Les Slater

times downright dismissive of what one presumed to be his own side of the ethnic divide. So the sweeping generalization made in some quarters that a Warner victory in the by-election is illustrative of some shifting in Trinidad and Tobago's ingrained tradition of ethnic voting is somewhat flawed, given Warner's political gyrations over time that have brought him to where he now stands.

It is very unlikely that any objective review of Warner -- during his long tenure in FIFA or in activities concurrent with or following this – would conclude otherwise than here's an individual for whom moral high ground is seemingly a non-existent concept. An individual who might be the personification of the definitive artful dodger. But in routinely designating a small slice of his personal pie for "good works" display, he has cunningly created a deflecting mechanism. The tactic assures that there would always be some few befogged and beguiled by the veneer of caring and/or benevolence and content to be blind to the slithery path that made it possible. It is, in the truest sense, finely tuned trickery.

Despite a song and dance about opting to work for his people, Warner's departure from his cushy position in FIFA was hardly voluntary. Neither he nor Bissessar had earlier seen the need for him to leave the FIFA post in the clear conflict of interest created when he was named a government minister. Warner's FIFA exit was obviously occasioned by an impending investigation into his role in the bribing of Caribbean football executives at a meeting in Port of Spain.


Questions have apparently remained unresolved over funds from FIFA entrusted to Warner for earthquake relief in Haiti, following allegations that the amount of the FIFA donation was considerably compromised by the time it got to the intended recipients.

Controversy endures also over the Centre of Excellence, a facility in Trinidad said to have been bankrolled by FIFA and supposedly intended primarily for footballrelated business. Warner contends the FIFA funds were gifted to him; FIFA has insisted otherwise.

Some Warner apologists have, in bizarre fashion, attempted to rationalize these and other bouts of dirty dealing with the claim that Trinis or black folk have not been the ones victimized. The people of Haiti and the members of Trinidad and Tobago's 2006 World Cup squad, denied for years by Warner their rightful participation fees until it was quietly settled recently, would disagree.

Warner compounds this boundless avarice with being coarse, uncouth, altogether unprincipled. In this period of extended farewell to saintly Nelson Mandela, it behooves Trinidad and Tobago nationals to recall Warner's embarking on a trip to South Africa with then party leader Basdeo Panday during an election campaign to "hustle" Mandela for a photo op/endorsement.

The notion that Warner's byelection win magically makes of him a Puritan is fantasy. He is, as newspaper columnist Michael Harris once noted, "the prince of perfidy." That's not about to change. And there's no consideration more critical for Trinidad and Tobago's people in assessing this man.

Continued from page 10 like Walmart and McDonald's are choosing to take advantage of the low minimum wage and shortchange their workers - and our nation.

Whenever we talk about raising the minimum wage, critics claim that it will cause increased unemployment. But this has been carefully refuted in an extensive series of studies of the impact of actual minimum wage increases. For example, a study by the Institute for Research on Labor and Employment published in The Review of Economics and Statistics,

November 2010, compared every pair of neighboring U.S. counties that had differing minimum wage levels at any time between 1990 and 2006. It found no adverse employment effects from higher minimum wages.

The \$7.25 minimum wage comes to just \$15,080 a year for full-time workers. That's too low to live on and it's undermining our economy. If the minimum wage had been automatically adjusted for the cost of living since the 1960s, businesses would be paying \$10.74 today. The Fair Minimum Wage Act would

gradually increase the minimum wage to \$10.10 over three years, and then adjust it annually for inflation. These provisions are fair and reasonable.

Employers who pretend they cannot pay a minimum wage equivalent to what their counterparts paid in the 1960s should be ashamed of themselves.

Raising the minimum wage is an overdue investment in our economy.

Why would the Federal Reserve and the help the mortgage servicing industry keep secret information about the "systemic and widespread" practices that contributed to the near meltdown of the financial industry in 2008? And why would they refuse to help Members of Congress who are interested in preventing the same kind of abuses from happening again?

The reasons cited by the Fed and the OCC for not turning over the requested information are specious. According to an April 10 letter sent by Senator Warren and Representative Cummings to Den Bernanke

and Thomas Curry, respectively the heads of the Fed and OCC, their staff cited their obligation to prevent disclosure of confidential supervisory bank examination information. Staff for the Fed and the OCC also referred to documents about illegal practices by a mortgage serving company as a "trade secret." As the letter concisely states, however, "Breaking the law is not a corporate trade secret." The Fed and the OCC's

decision to deny a Congressional request for information suggest that they are acting less as regulators of the financial sector than as protectors of industry. Considering that in the wake of the financial crisis, critics

often pointed to the seemingly cozy relationship between government regulators and the sector they were supposed to be overseeing, it is time for the Fed and the OCC to rethink their stance. Complying with the request for information is the best way to make sure those mortgage servicing companies that irresponsibly damaged lives and communities by engaging in illegal acts are held accountable, and to make sure similar practices do not happen again.

afford to live in. This cannot happen again. As Sandy money gets allocated, we need our new mayor to direct city entities, particularly the Economic Development Corporation, to put the needs of low-income and vulnerable New Yorkers first and ensure good jobs and affordable housing result from these new investments," said Bobby Tolbert, a member leader with VOCAL-NY.

"Public housing was suffering from neglect pre-Sandy, and the problems have gotten worse. Repairs aren't getting done and mold problems are expanding. There's rain coming through the 11th Floor, and the roof still has not been repaired. Money needs to get to public housing developments and residents need to be able to get the work. There needs to

be more involvement with the community to develop a plan. Public housing residents are being left out of the discussion and forgotten. If the real voice of the people was at the table, decisions and priorities would be different," said Vernell Robinson, a Community Voices Heard (CVH) member-leader and Carleton Manor resident in Far Rockaway, Queens.

"After Sandy, we were the first to help families remove water from flooded basements, clean up debris removal, demolition, and other home infrastructure repairs in the coastal areas of the city. As the city seeks to invest in the rebuilding, it is necessary to ensure responsible contractors are creating good job opportunities with justice, dignity and respect," Eudes Salas, a day laborer and member of the Workers Justice Project

THE CARIBBEAN BUSINESS REPORT Dawn Skeete serves up healthy ethnic meals

Dawn Skeete arrived in New York in 1971 from Jamaica; she was 10 yearsold and came of age here. Thoroughly American, she is still deeply embedded in Jamaican culture.

After a career for almost two decades as a management consultant at TIAA-CREF, the company relocated. Faced with: "What should I do?" Skeete turned to food.

Skeete is the founder and owner, with her mother and husband as partners, of Jamaica Grill, 321 Nostrand Ave., a catering and take out restaurant that has all the typical Jamaican foods that remind diners of home. The restaurant opened in 2009.

Her Bed-Stuy restaurant attracts folks from all races and classes and in addition to Jamaican style, she says, "I try to do a fusion with other cultures," like Rasta pasta, mixing Jamaican with Italian, or mixing it up with Chinese in jerk shrimp fried rice.

Jamaica cooking is not necessarily healthy, but that's not how Skeete sees it. "The ingredients are healthy," she says. And she wants to keep them so.

Like any small business, it has its ups and downs and Skeete found out about the

free business training courses offered by Flatbush-based CAMBA's Small Business Services and signed on for the 10-week "Entrepreneurial Assistance Program— Taking Care of Business (TCB)" that guides existing and start-up businesses in writing a comprehensive, investor-ready business plan. One of her goals: to grow the business.

More basic courses such as the month-long "Writing a Business Plan 101" are also offered. Contact: smallbiz@ camba.org, 718-282-2500.) Among her class of 15 participants there were formal and informal business owners and some looking to start a business. Some like herself had graduated college without a clue of financial management. "I fell into that category," she admits and that learning how to look at the finances of running a business was one of the most important lessons of the class.

Market Feasibility and Industry Analysis (how to use research to drive the business) was an integral component in the program. This course requirement took time and investigation but, her research affected the trajectory of her business.

She discovered how high the prevalence of diabetes was in the geographic area of her business and also, how limited access was to healthy foods.

"What can we do to help people do better in ordering," she thought, wanting to offer a variety of menu items and provide a product to satisfy their needs. For her final project in class—the pitch given on the last day, she described a diabetic and healthy menu she wanted to implement at her restaurant.

With zeal for healthy-eating and a passionate presentation, CAMBA tapped Skeete to give a three-session series in healthy cooking demonstrations-followed by enjoying the foods presented- to the central Brooklyn community, this summer.

The just-completed July series, held at the Dutch Reformed Church on Flatbush and Church, was part of Emblem Health's Live Healthy program partnered with Greater Brooklyn Health Coalition (GBGH), among others.

The first week menu included roasted chicken and vegetables; the second week, grilled salmon and salad, the final week included tilapia, rice and peas cooked with coconut milk and a mélange of cooked greens.

Skeete talked about healthy techniques in cooking-focusing on cutting down on salt with tasty seasonings.

Her mantra: when available, always use fresh herbs. She described her pepper sauce as a blend of thyme, ginger, garlic, onion and scotch bonnet pepper. These aromatics, mixed in a blender, were cooked with the chopped mustard, kale and collard greens, adding incredible flavor.

Canarsie-resident Evalina Irish-Spencer anxiously awaited the last session, having also attended the previous two .

"Don't laugh," she answered to the question, what do you do? "I'm a dietitian (with a Masters degree). I give classes. I took these classes to be on the other side and relax and I'm having a blast."

What has she learned? "I learned about seasonings so you don't have to use salt. I'll use on my own at home.' At the final demo, Skeete gave samples of her special (secret) seasoning and hot sauce.

Jamaican envoy says many challenges remain

As Jamaicans in the United States begin celebrating their 51st anniversary of political independence from Great Britain, the country's ambassador to the U.S. says many challenges remain.

In his independence message to nationals in the Diaspora, Stephen Vasciannie said the Jamaican State "needs to develop its capacity not only to resist external economic shocks but also to tackle fully the serious problem of public indebtedness.

"The State must also enhance its ability to generate self-sustaining growth, even as efforts are made to ensure greater fairness and equity in the economic sphere," he said.

With these considerations in mind, Vasciannie said the government of Prime Minister Portia Simpson-Miller completed this year arrangements with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and other multilateral financial institutions "that are intended to lend stability to the Jamaican economy.

"The arrangements with the Fund, when coupled with aspects of the government's growth agenda, should help Jamaica to reduce some of its economic challenges in the near- and medium-term," the envoy said.

For these challenges to be fully overcome, however, Vasciannie said the country will need to "redouble its commitment to greater productivity and increased efficiency.

"In the drive for economic and social development, Jamaica will continue to benefit from the substantial contribution of persons in the Diaspora who look to the homeland for emotional and cultural sustenance," he said.

"The recently-concluded Diaspora Conference and the many contributions of Diaspora groups to the country affirm yet again that the Jamaican people are determined to ensure that we find pathways to success," he added.

"As we enter the period of Independence, may we celebrate our achievements and recommit ourselves to prosperity in Jamaica, 'Land We Love'," Vasciannie continued.

Jamaicans in the New York metropolitan area begin their independence anniversary celebrations on Sunday with a Service of Thanksgiving at Lenox Road Baptist Church on Nostrand Avenue in Brooklyn.

Flag-raising ceremonies will be held on Friday, Aug. 9 at Brooklyn Borough Hall, and East Orange and Paterson City Halls in New Jersey.

The grand 51st Anniversary of Independence Ball takes place on Aug. 17 at the Hilton New York in midtown Manhattan.

WHO urges strong response against hepatitis

On World Hepatitis Day, on Sunday, the World Health Organization (WHO) is urging Caribbean and other governments to act against the five hepatitis viruses that can cause severe liver infections and lead to 1.4 million deaths every year.

The Geneva, Switzerland-based WHO said some of these hepatitis viruses, most notably types B and C, can also lead to chronic and debilitating illnesses, such as liver cancer and cirrhosis.

The viruses can result in the loss of income and high medical expenses for hundreds of millions of people worldwide, the WHO said.

It said viral hepatitis is referred to as a "silent epidemic" because most persons do not realize that they are infected and, over decades, slowly progress to liver disease.

The WHO said many countries are only now realizing the magnitude of the disease burden and devising ways to address it.

"The fact that many hepatitis B and C infections are silent, causing no symptoms until there is severe damage to the liver, points to the HEALTH

urgent need for universal access to immunization, screening, diagnosis and antiviral therapy," said Dr Keiji Fukuda, WHO Assistant Director-General for Health Security and the Environment.

"Many of the measures needed to prevent the spread of viral hepatitis disease can be put in place right now, and doing so will offset the heavy economic costs of treating and hospitalizing patients in future," he added.

This year, in the run-up to World Hepatitis Day, the WHO has released its first-ever country hepatitis survey, covering 126 countries.

The WHO "Global Policy Report on the Prevention and Control of Viral Hepatitis in WHO Member States" identifies successes, as well as gaps, at country level in the implementation of four priority areas.

The priority areas are raising awareness, evidence-based data for action, prevention of transmission, and screening, care and treatment. The findings show that 37 per-

cent of the countries have national strategies for viral hepatitis, and more work is needed in treating hepatitis.

It also highlights that while most of the countries (82 percent) have established hepatitis surveillance programs, only half of them include the monitoring of chronic hepatitis B and C, which are responsible for most severe illnesses and deaths.

"Many of the measures needed to prevent the spread of viral hepatitis disease can be put in place right now, and doing so will offset the heavy economic costs of treating and hospitalizing patients in future," said Dr. Sylvie Briand, director, Pandemic and Epidemic Diseases at WHO.

"The findings underline the important work that is being done by governments to halt hepatitis through the implementation of WHO recommended policies and actions," she added.

The WHO said the challenges posed by hepatitis were formally acknowledged by the World Health Assembly in 2010, when it adopted

Hepatitis B and C, which are responsible for most severe illnesses and deaths.

its first resolution on viral hepatitis, and called for a comprehensive approach to prevention and control.

"This has promoted a new era of awareness with more governments proactively working to address the disease," the WHO said.

Reinforcing that call for action, the WHO said it has been collaborating closely with countries and partners to build a strong global response.

As a result, the new report notes, 38 percent of countries observe World Hepatitis Day, an annual event that began in 2010, with even more countries expected to mark the day this year.

In addition to collaborating closely with countries, the WHO said it has been working on developing networks and mechanisms that can deliver results.

The organization said it is


exploring with international funding agencies avenues that could allow hepatitis to be included in their current program of activities.

In June 2013, the WHO launched the Global Hepatitis Network. One of its aims is to support countries with planning and implementation of viral hepatitis plans and programs.

The WHO is currently developing new hepatitis C screening, care and treatment guidelines, which will provide recommendations on seven key areas, such as testing approaches; behavioral interventions (alcohol reduction); noninvasive assessment of liver fibrosis; and the selection of hepatitis C drug combinations.

"New, more effective medicines to prevent the progression of chronic hepatitis B and C are in the pipeline," said Dr. Stefan Wiktor, team lead of WHO's Global Hepatitis Program.

"However, these will be expensive, and therapy will require monitoring with sophisticated laboratory tests," he added. "To cure and reduce the spread of these viruses, medicines must become more accessible."




Olivia Dawson never wanted much.

Though it's a little predictable, "A Family Affair" ain't too bad.



Who is Claudia Gordon?

VKP: Growing up, who were your role models?

CG: My mother was my most influential role model. She was a woman of profound faith and perseverance up until the very day she lost her six year battle with ovarian cancer in 2000. Growing up, I witnessed her hard work and sacrifices as she struggled to raise my two siblings and me, all on her own, deep in the rural countryside of Jamaica, W.I. A domestic servant with only an eighth grade education, she literally scrubbed her way to America one garment at a time. My aunt Mildred is a teacher, and as such she instilled in us the importance of a good education.

At the age of 74, she is still teaching today.

There are scores of other individuals I could name because behind every successful person are plenty of people: role models, mentors, colleagues, friends and family members. No one gets here by him or herself so I am grateful to a lot of people.



VKP: How did vou become interested in working for the Federal government?

CG: My interest in working for the Federal government was sparked while working as a Skadden Fellow and staff attorney at the National Association of the Deaf (NAD) Law and Advocacy Center from 2000-2002. The NAD operates on a shoe-string budget and the law center staff fluctuates from two to four full time attorneys working tirelessly to keep pace with incoming discrimination claims and requests for technical assistance from among the 36 million deaf and hard of hearing individuals in America. It was there that I confronted the truth that passing legislation is one thing but actual implementation

with enforcement is another. I felt that a job with the Fed-

eral government would more effectively allow me to affect the actual enforcement of laws such as the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, thereby alleviating the blatant discrimination that people with disabilities continue to face.

VKP: What inspired you to pursue your field of interest?

CG: When I suddenly lost my ability to hear at the age of eight, I was taken out of school and kept at home to perform chores. Friends slowly disappeared and what was usually a cheerful hello was replaced by an awkward smile, curious stares and even outright ridicule. There were also those long road trips on the bumpy Jamaican

roads to distant towns where healers would perform rituals in attempts to cure me. I thought I was the only deaf person in the world. I did not realize until years later that a woman who everyone in my town knew as "dummy," and who children my age would incessantly harass with stone throwing, was deaf. Looking back, I wish I knew her real name. What I do know is that the life of this woman - ostracized as "dummy" almost became my own but for my mother's triumph in successfully bringing me to America by the time I was eleven years old.

By my junior year in high school, I made it known to all that I would go to law school and become an attorney. Many shrugged off my grand intention as wishful thinking. Some cited my deafness as an obstacle rendering it impractical if not impossible to pursue a law degree. Thanks to the values that were instilled in me during my formative years, I understood then that those voices of doubt neither

dictated my worth nor my capacity. I want to contribute to a better society where there is more understanding and acceptance of people with disabilities and where the same opportunities are provided for all.

VKP: What keeps you motivated?

CG: I am motivated by knowing that although progress is being made towards inclusion and access, there is still a great deal more work to be done. Also, mentoring youth and young adults with disabilities keeps me motivated. I have an innate desire to give back. It is uplifting when you are

able to. It is uplifting when you are able to empower another and help someone to empower another and help someone discover a sense of self-worth and confidence in his or her abilities.

VKP: How do you balance work and family life?

CG: To be honest, I don't. But I am blessed with supportive family and friends who know that the long hours I spend at work are spent doing something important. And I know they are proud, patient and ready to welcome me home when this tour of duty, in service of our country, is done.



According to Martin, "calls are mounting from music lovers and members" to reconsider next year's proposed location.

Last Saturday at a Trayvon Martin rally held at the Federal Building in Chicago and hosted by the National Action Network (NAN) and Chicago's talk radio station WVON AM, Martin was again asked to seriously reconsider taking the 2014 event to Florida. Since the acquittal of

George Zimmerman, recording and performing artists Eddie LeVert of the Ojays, Stephanie Mills. Dionne Warwick. Madonna, Rod Stewart, Mary Mary, Kanye west, Jay Z and others have followed the lead after Stevie Wonder led the charge by announcing his boycott in Quebec, Canada. Wonder's decision to abstain from performing in Florida also includes 20 other states whose similar laws are perceived to impact favorably to whites while disadvantageous to Black.

Martin said he will be heading to South Florida next week to meet with his Florida team and to make further announcements about the 33rd IRAW-MA.

Initially known as the International Reggae Music Awards, the annual celebration was founded in 1982 in Chicago by then photojournalist and activist Ephraim Martin.

He said its mission was "to use reggae music as a vehicle of expression for the voiceless peoples of the world, to help free Nelson Mandela (who was in Prison), to end Apartheid and to honor reggae and world music entertainers who were making outstanding contributions to world music and to humanity."

Other categories of music were later added after nearly a decade of honoring the reggae genre and renaming it to IRAWMA.

Documentary about rise of Rwanda Cycling Team

"Rising from Ashes" Very Good (3 stars) Unrated In English and Kinyarwanda with subtitles Running time: 80 minutes Distributor: First Run **Features**

Over the course of a hundred days in 1994, the East African nation of Rwanda experienced an ethnic cleansing which consumed the lives of nearly a fifth of the population. The mass slaughter came as a consequence of a revolt by the majority tribe, the Hutus, against the Tutsis, a minority which, with the help of the country's European colonizers, had enjoyed a higher social and economic status for centuries.

A few years after the cessation of the civil war, American bike rac-

ing legend Jock Boyer was looking for a chance at redemption in the wake of being paroled after serving time in prison for lewd behavior. He found that opportunity he needed upon moving to Rwanda at the suggestion of a friend.

There, he took on the unenviable challenge of coaching the national cycling team. And over the next six years he trained them while teaching them how to compete on the level of World-Class athletes with the hope of one day qualifying for the Olympics.

That seemingly impossible quest is the subject of Rising from Ashes, an uplifting, overcomingthe-odds documentary directed by T.C. Johnstone. Narrated by Forest Whitaker, the film introduces us to the ragtag crew of raw recruits, including prima donna Abraham, mischievous Nathan and strongman Nyandwi, that Jock had to try to whip into fighting shape.

But besides athleticism, the

intrepid coach had to worry about ter century-old, brakeless, woodhis young protégés equipment, since they were riding on quar-



Secures bragging rights over rival Mexico

The USA won the 2013 CONCACAF Gold Cup title on Sunday when it defeated a fighting Panama team, 1-0, at Chicago's Soldier. It was the second time the teams met in a Goal Cup final; the US topped Panama in a penalty shootout, 3-1, when the 2005 final ended in a goalless draw. On Sunday, forward Break Shea tapped in a cross from Alejandro Bedoya in the 69th minute for victory in front of a crowd of 57,920.

The U.S. has now won the tournament five times, one less than Mexico, with

Canada the only other winner of the competition, which was played for the 12th time. U.S. midfielder Kyle Beckerman was named Man of the Match. American Landon Donovan was awarded the Golden Ball as most outstanding player Continued on Page 44

The Gold Cup had the Latin touch from Central America and Mexico, the Caribbean speed and athleticism was on display while the USA and Canada showed the hardworking style that is representative of North America.


