# **US postpones immigrant plan**

thousands of illegal Caribbean and immigrants were to begin applying for work permits and legal protection, the United States has jettisoned sweeping executive actions on immigration indefinitely.

White House officials said President Barack Obama decided to postpone the plan in order to comply with a federal judge's last-minute order Monday night in halting the programs.

In his 123-page ruling, Judge A day before hundreds of Andrew S. Hanen said Obama administration officials had provided "perplexing" misrepresentations of the scope and impact of the president's actions.

He said the new programs were "a substantive change to immigration policy," and that they were, "in effect, a new law."

The judge dismissed the argument that those changes were a proper exercise of prosecutorial discretion, ruling that

the administration had engaged in "a complete abdication" of enforcement.

Hanen said the U.S. Department of Homeland Security cannot "enact a program whereby it not only ignores the dictates of Congress, but actively acts to thwart them."

According to the New York Times, the judge's ruling was a "significant setback for the president, who had asserted broad authority to take execu-Continued on Page 8

CARIB TIDE TURNS New gov't in St. Kitts & Nevis

The first of three general elections which are expected to produce new governments in the Caribbean Community this year was held in St. Kitts on Monday with the opposition Team Unity Party led by disgruntled former members of the outgoing administration winning a clear majority of the parliamentary seats and unseating a controversial cabinet that had run the country for the past 20 years.

Prime Minister Denzil Douglas who until Monday had been the most senior and longest serving leader in CARICOM conceded defeat to incoming Prime Minister Timothy Harris who had been his one-time foreign affairs and finance minister but who grew increasingly unhappy about the level of corruption on the twin-island Federation with St. Kitts, a controversial dollars for citizenship scheme and the general lack of accountability in governmental affairs.

Team Unity walked away with seven of the 11 seats that were up for grabs, giving it an easy parliamentary majority to pass new or amend existing legislation.

In all five general elections are scheduled in the regional bloc this year with St. Kitts-Nevis being first out of the bloc. Guvana's which is scheduled for May 11 is likely to be next unless Ralph Gonsalves in St. Vincent or Kamla Persad-Bissessar in Trinidad decides to name a date before May 11. Suriname has already scheduled this for late May, almost five years to the date of the previous election.

Like Gonsalves, President Desi Bouterse is likely to win a second five-year term. Polls show that Guyana and Trinidad will likely have new administrations.

Harris and Team Unity cabinet ministers are expected to be sworn in to office late this week. The holding of island Continued on Page 8

# **Clarke honors** African-Americans

As part of African-American History Month celebrations, Brooklyn Congresswoman Yvette D. Clarke has introduced a resolution in the US House of Representatives, with several of her congressional colleagues, honoring the "enormous contributions" of African-Americans in the Armed Forces of the United States.

"From the Revolutionary War and the Civil War to World War II and the War on Terrorism, African-American women and men have been dedicated members of our armed forces and decorated for their excellence in battle," said Clarke, Democratic representative for the 9th Congressional District in Brooklyn.

"Yet, in the not-so-distant past, when many of these soldiers returned from their military service, they faced discrimination back home, here in the United States, the nation to which they swore their allegiance," she added.

Clarke noted that, after World War I, the 369th Infantry, known as the "Harlem Hellfighters," was awarded the Croix de Guerre, the highest military honor in France.

However, because they were African-American, their heroism was not acknowledged here at home, Clarke said.

Before breaking the "color barrier" in Major League Baseball, the congresswoman said the legendary Jackie Robinson was court martialed by the Army for refusing to sit in the back of the bus while he was stationed in Fort Hood, TX.

When Medgar and Charles Evers returned from World War II, both veterans were not allowed to register to vote, she also noted.

Guyanese Jamaican carrier, Fly Jamaica Airways will commence its non-stop flights from John F. Kennedy Airport to Cheddi Jagan Airport beginning on Saturday, Feb. 21.

The airline will allow passengers two pieces of luggage at 50 pounds each and a carry-on weighing less that 22 pounds.

### THE NEWS FROM BACK HOME

#### Caribbean

The Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) Commission is now calling for the removal of roaming fees within its nine-member grouping.

Roaming fees are additional charges attached to mobile phone calls made or received beyond a specified geographical jurisdiction.

"We're not talking about the fancy marketing glitz of something called

roaming or anything like that. We want the removal of roaming," said OECS Director Dr. Didacus Jules.



The countries of the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) form a single economic union, but citizens still pay roaming fees between Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, Grenada, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, St. Kitts-Nevis, Montserrat, Anguilla and the British Virgin Islands.

#### Antigua

Eleven convicts who were serving time for various "minor" offences at Her Majestv's Prison on Antigua and Barbuda were recently freed.

This was disclosed by Minister for Public Safety, Stedroy "Cutie" Benjamin.

The 11 comprised one woman, Wendy Tavanier and 10 men.

The passage in parliament of the Criminal Procedure

Amendment Act 2014. in November, paved the way for the convicts to be released.



Under the Act, those

with convictions dating back to 2003 and onward would have the time spent on remand awaiting committal, trial and/ or sentencing, discounted from the jail sentence imposed by the court.

Those released were serving time of offences ranging from larceny to possession of marijuana and use of threatening language.

#### **Bahamas**

The Court of Appeal in the Bahamas has once again dealt a blow to attempts by legislators to define which offenses are eligible for death.

In its recent ruling in the case of Anthony Jerome Clarke, the Court of Appeal said that a contract killing does not necessarily fall in the category of the worst of the worst.

Last year, the case of Mario Flowers, the court ruled that the murder of a policeman acting in the execu-

tion of his duty was not a death eligible offense.

The former government in 2011 passed legislation that designated the murder of a policeman and contract killings as

death eligible offenses.

Murders committed during a felony were also defined as death eligible.

Clarke killed Aleus Tilus in September 2011 after luring him to an establishment in Gambie under the guise of having a sandwich with him.

Clarke was paid \$5,000 by Tilus's former employers, according to evidence. Tilus was shot three times.

The court upheld Clarke's conviction and he is waiting resentencing.


Flowers was resentenced to 29 years in prison for the murder of Constable Ramos Williams.

#### **Barbados**

Stuart was quoted in the statement as saying that the island was beginning to feel the effects of the falling oil prices.



#### **Cayman Island**

Cayman Islands Premier Alden Mc Laughlin said recently that while overall unemployment appears to be tapering off. particularly among the Caymanian labor force, the number of work permits held by non-Caymanians has begun to grow.

According to McLaughlin, total unemployment in Cayman is expected to fall

from 6.3 percent in the mid 2013 to 5.9 percent in mid-2015 and eventually shrink to 4.9 percent in mid-2018.



# St. Kitts prime minister dethroned



St. Kitts and Nevis Prime Minister Dr. Denzil Douglas, whose St. Kitts and Nevis Labor Party (SKNLP) had ruled the twin-island federation for four consecutive fivevear terms, was dethroned in Monday's general elections.

Team Unity, an amalgam of three opposition parties, headed by Douglas's former Foreign Affairs Minister Dr. Timothy Harris, 51, won the elections with seven of 11 Parliamentary seats, according to Supervisor of Elections, Wingrove George.

George, who had suspended the vote count on Monday night amid uneasiness in the State, made the announcement on Tuesday.

While not giving figures for each seat contested, prom- ple's Labor Party (PLP), the

# **Another T&T** minister under investigation

The Trinidad and Tobago Police are investigating an allegation against another Cabinet minister in connection with the witness tampering scandal made by fired National Security Minister Gary Griffith in the defamation case brought by former Attorney General Anand Ramlogan against Opposition Leader Dr. Keith Rowley.

Ramlogan, who was also sent packing by Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar recently, is under a police probe.

Griffith has named Trade and Industry Minister Vasant Bharath as the minister who allegedly tried to influence him not to speak out in the witness tampering matter involving Ramlogan and Police Complaints Authority (PCA) Director David West.

Griffith said the move to

silence him took place at the Diplomatic Centre, St. Clair, Port of Spain on Jan. 29.

The allegation levelled against Ramlogan is that six days before West was appointed PCA director, he (Ramlogan) telephoned him and asked that he withdraw his witness statement in a libel case relating to the failed extradition involving Section 34 applicants Steve Ferguson and Ishwar Galbaransingh (two United National Congress (UNC) financiers) in exchange for him being selected for the iob.

Ramlogan has denied the allegation, which is now subject to a police probe.

Police sources say that the former National Security Minister has reportedly implicated two other Cabinet ministers in the chain of events in the alleged witness tampering matter.



# **IMMIGRATION GUIDE**

#### **REMOVING IMMIGRATION NIGHTMARES** There are solutions to problems immigrants frequently experience. Among the problems and solutions are the following:



**1. GETTING MARRIED TO** A US CITIZEN OR GREEN **CARD HOLDER AND BEING** ABUSED OR ABANDONED **BY THE SPOUSE:** If you are married to a

US Citizen or green card holder who is abusive or has abandoned you, you may be entitled to a work permit and green card even if you are divorced or have a criminal record. You do not need your spouse to file for you or sponsor you or attend the interview with you. This relief is also applicable to child (including step child), fi ancée and parent of US citizens or green card holder. You can also get relief if you are married to a citizen or green card holder who was already married but did not divorce before marrying you, that is, a bigamy or polygamy situation.

#### 2. PARENTS OF US CITIZEN WANTING TO WORK AND MAINTAIN THEIR CHILDREN:

Are you a parent of a US Citizen Child or Green card holder? You may be administratively approved for

a work permit to enable you to maintain your family. This is an administrative relief subject to

### discretion of the government officials.

#### 3. ILLEGAL ENTRY INTO THE US:

This is a major problem but there is relief for special immigrants married to a US Citizen or green card holder or those who have US citizen children. You may still get a work permit and green card.

#### 4. ILLEGAL REENTRY AFTER DEPORTATION:

Did you enter the US after being deported? This is a crime. There is relief for special immigrants married to a US Citizen or green card holder. Hurry to talk to us before you are arrested. You may be entitled to relief?

#### 5. WORK PERMIT AND GREEN CARD FOR CHIL-DREN AND YOUNG PERSONS:

• Are you less than 21 years old? Are you living in the US dependent on some-

one other than your parent? Is your natural parent dead or lack viable means to take care of you?


· Do you think it is not in your best interest to return to country of birth or citizenship now? You may be entitled to work permit and or green card whether you entered with visa or not. You may still be approved even if you entered without inspection, entered with fraudulent document or overstayed your visa or have certain criminal record.

# Manning bows out from T&T politics

Former Trinidad and Tobago Prime Minister Patrick Manning has bowed out of politics after serving as a Member of Parliament (MP) for 43 years.

Manning's history-making tenure as the longest serving MP for the constituency of San Fernando East in the Southern City of T&T came to a premature end when 36-year-old attorney Randall Mitchell was named as his successor and the candidate for the 2015 general election following the screening of candidates at the People's National Movement (PNM) San Fernando East constituency last week.

The former prime minister sent a letter to Dr. Rowley indicating that if his health had improved and he is healed he can face the screening committee.

"In the foregoing context it is now clear that although there has been some improvement of my condition, my health has not improved sufficiently. I therefore bow out of politics under the circumstances. It is for this reason that I did not face the screening committee," he said.

Manning, 69, was the fourth prime minister of Trinidad and Tobago from December 1991 to 1995 and again from December 2001 to May 2006.

He was also political leader of the PNM from 1987 to 2010 when he called a snap general election and his party lost to the Kamla Persad-Bissessar led coalition People's Partnership Party (PP).

The PP won 29 seats in the 41-seat House of Representative. Manning

resigned as political leader of the PNM a few days later.

But, Manning retained his San Fernando East seat, which he held for 27 years. His nemesis Dr. Keith Rowley was voted as the new PNM leader last year.

Two years ago Manning suffered a stroke and had to seek treatment in the United States

He was leader of the opposition from 1986 to 1990 and again from 1995 to 2001.

When the PNM lost the General Election in 1986, Manning was one of three PNM candidates who retained their seats. He became leader of the opposition and within two months he was elected to the post of political leader of the PNM.

# Caribbean on measles watch

The United Nations says its health agency has called for "stepped-up" surveillance to prevent the spread of measles in the Americas, including the Caribbean.

The U.N. said on Wednesday that the recent outbreaks of measles - one of the leading causes of deaths among young children - in the United States and Brazil suggest that immunization rates in some areas have dropped below levels needed to prevent the spread of imported into the Americas.

The U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), based in Washington, D.C., have reported that there were 147 confirmed measles cases in four countries of the Americas this year, as of Feb. 8.

"Of that total, 121 cases were in the United States, linked primarily to an outbreak that began at Disneyland in California last December," said the PAHO/WHO statement, adding that a single case in Mexico was also tied

to that outbreak. Of the remaining cases, 21 were in Brazil and four were in Canada.

"Thanks to high levels of immunization, the Americas have been on track for more than a decade to be formally declared free of measles," said Dr. Cuauhtemoc Ruiz, head of PAHO/ WHO's immunization program. "Maintaining high levels of vaccine coverage is key to preventing and halting outbreaks and to protect our populations from the constant threat of imported cases."

Measles had been considered eliminated from the Americas since 2002, due to the absence of endemic transmission of the disease as the result of the region's success in achieving high levels of immunization, the U.N. said.

Now, measles elimination "is facing major challenges, with several ongoing importations of measles in some countries," said PAHO/WHO in an epidemiological alert distributed Tuesday to member-countries across the region.

# Team Unity Party wins elections

elections came just three days after the two main opposition parties in Guyana said that they are so determined to effect change in the country that they had formed a united coalition to oust the governing People's Party (PPP) from office after almost 23 years in office.

Like St. Kitts, leaders of A Partnership For National Unity (APNU) and the Alliance For Change (AFC) in Guyana say they can take no more of the widespread level of greed and graft of PPP ministers and top players, many of who openly flaunt the wealth they have acquired from wheeling and dealing with investors or from skimming millions from numerous local and foreignfunded projects. They want the PPP out.

They also plan to set up an investigative tribunal that could likely bring criminal charges against top officials for their years of association with the narco trade, private hit squads which executed dozens of criminal suspects and the criminalization of nearly every layer of Guyanese society.

Until the pre-election agreement was announced Saturday evening, the

two parties, the AFC in particular, had vowed never to team up with APNU for fears it would have killed its election chances but the AFC said it did so in the interest of the country and at the behest of groups and individuals who think it is the surest way of ousting the PPP.

They have already given the nation a modus as to how cabinet and other positions will be shared, with APNU's Leader retired army general David Granger being the presidential candidate and journalist turned attorney Moses Nagamootoo of the AFC being the nominee for prime minister.

tive actions in the face of congressional Republicans' refusal to overhaul the immigration system."

White House officials, however, said Obama's action is "legal and proper," according to the Times.

Judge Hanen, of Federal District Court for the Southern District of Texas, in Brownsville, ruled in favor of Texas and 25 other states that had challenged the president's immigration plan.

Hanen said that the administration's programs would impose significant burdens on states, unleashing illegal immigration and straining state budgets.

He added that Washington had not followed required procedures for changing federal rules.

But President Obama vowed on Tuesday to appeal the court ruling, expressing confidence that he would prevail in the legal battle to defend his signature domestic policy achievement.

"The law is on our side, and history is on our side," he said.

White House officials said the government would continue preparing to put Obama's executive actions into effect but would not begin accepting applications from illegal workers until the legal case was settled, according to the Times.

In the interim, Obama urged Republican legislators to return to negotiations on a broader overhaul of immigration laws. "We should not be tearing some mom away from her child when the child has been born here and that mom has been living here the last 10 years minding her own business and being an important part of the community," he said.

But White House officials and some legal scholars noted that another federal judge had dismissed a different challenge to the president's executive actions, and they predicted that Judge Hanen's decision was likely to be suspended by the appeals court, according to the Times.

"Federal supremacy with respect to immigration matters makes the states a kind of interloper in disputes between the president and Congress," said Laurence H. Tribe, a professor of constitutional law at Harvard. "They don't have any right of their own."

Immigrant advocates, at the same time, derided Hanen's ruling, saying he had failed to consider the benefits to national security and the economy of having millions of unauthorized immigrants begin taking background checks and paying taxes.

Advocates said they would continue to prepare immigrants to file applications, assuming that the programs go into effect soon.

"Detractors of these programs may try to paint this as a fight with the president, but make no mistake: Attempts to dismantle these programs are attacks on American families," said Janet Murguía, president of NCLR, also known as the National Council of La Raza, the country's largest Latino organization.

# Don't take Black History Month for granted

Black History Month is almost over. Why do we celebrate it anyway? Because we must. We owe it to ourselves, regardless of where we fit among the Census Bureau's categories. Awareness of the contributions of Black men and women to the betterment of civilization should be embedded in every educated person who is sensitive to the world around us. And those who are not as well.

Blacks in America and abroad are and have been far greater donors in all areas of human achievement that has been credited in textbooks, films, newspaper...

People should not need to be reminded that Blacks in America and abroad are and have been far greater donors in all areas of human achievement that has been credited in textbooks, films, newspaper archives and family conversations over dinner tables. They are represented, though largely unacknowledged, in the pantheon of luminaries in every field.

Yet every February, our school bulletin boards and television mini-spots always fea-

ture the same superstars. We should study and admire them, but we should also expand the scope of eminence and spread the word about these dignitaries whose notability extends beyond sports, entertainment, community organizing and civil rights/ social justice activism. There must be none of the restrictions on sectors of praise as there have historically been to access to society's playing fields.

The general absence of a more panoramic view of Black excellence may subconsciously imply doubt of its legitimacy. That's why it's important that Black History Month not be merely a reference on a wall calendar but an internally-felt commitment to analysis.

Celebration of Black History Month shouldn't be begrudging or half-hearted. What we glean from it is part of the common inheritance of all communities and omitting it from our collective ancestral memories would amount to a pathetic assertion of supremacy on our part.

So let's look into ourselves during Black History Month and neither take the commemoration for granted nor view it as separate and apart from the creativity of the rest of humanity. The exemplars of Black culture must be fully integrated, not merely at the lunch counters, but in our shared hearts.

# People power, the solution to climate inaction

BRISBANE, Feb. 10, 2015 (IPS) - Nothing is more important to farmers like me than the weather. It affects the growth and quality of our crops and livestock, and has a major impact on global food supply.

The world's weather is being messed up by global warming, mainly caused by the burning of fossil fuels, which releases heat-trapping gases into the atmosphere.

If your bank lends money to coal, oil and gas projects, then take your business to one that doesn't. It will put a smile on your face.

Every national science organisation in the developed world agrees that global warming is real and caused by human activities. That's good enough for me.

If we keep on burning coal, oil and gas at 'business as usual' levels, our grandchildren will inhabit a planet some 5 degrees Celsius hotter by the end of the century – rendering large parts of it uninhabitable, including many currently densely populated areas, which will be under water due to melting glaciers and ice caps.

The impacts on farming in Australia (and everywhere else) of such a rise in temperature would be very severe indeed.

quickly to renewable energy, but sadly they are captives of the fossil fuel industry that funds their re-election campaigns.

Just look at the Nationals, who in spite of claiming to represent farmers, this month declared donations of 30,000 dollars from oil & gas company Santos, 25,000 from coal miner Peabody, and 50,000 dollars from prominent climate change denier and coal & oil company director Ian Plimer.

So, for the sake of future generations, we have to make this change happen ourselves, and the best way to do this is to disrupt the business model of companies trying to make money from fossil fuels by pulling the financial rug out from underneath them.

It's called divestment, which is simply the opposite of investment. Here's how it works. If you've got shares in fossil fuel companies, then sell them and invest in something that won't wreck the planet.

If your super fund invests in fossil fuels, then transfer your money to a fund that doesn't. If your bank lends money to coal, oil and gas projects, then take your business to one that doesn't. It will put a smile on your face.

The global movement to divest from fossil fuels is gaining momentum, and the more people that take part, the better it works. Share prices (just like wheat and cattle prices) are set by supply and demand, so as more people sell, the price falls.

When a company's share price falls far enough, it finds it more difficult to borrow money, with which to fund its next coal mine. Take oil and gas company Santos, for example. Due mainly to the recent plunge in oil prices, in the past six months its share price has dropped by almost 50 percent.

As a result, the company has announced plans to cut back on expenditure and reduce its operations.

On the flip side, the more money that flows into companies involved in renewable energy, energy efficiency and green technology, the faster they will grow and the sooner we can put a lid on runaway climate change.

A brave new world awaits. Let's divest together and change the future!

# An utterly un-presidential 2016 contender

The findings of a Rutgers-Eagleton survey on New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie released last week showed the governor's favorability numbers taking a nosedive, 42 percent of NJ voters approving and 52 percent disapproving of his performance in office. A far cry, this, from those salad days when, back in 2013, he was seeking a second term and, he would later admit, was looking to "run up the score" against his opponent as he and his retinue tried to bolster what they saw as presidential credentials in the man. True, the Bridgegate scandal that erupted in early 2014 wasn't exactly what Christie needed while trying to enhance his presidential prospects. But, as we've previously said here, with or without Bridgegate, realizing those grand ambitions was always going to be more challenging than Christie and his cheering section imagined.

It's amazing that one quality in a guy could at once be regarded as cute and saleable by sycophants and recognized by a more objective gaze as a deal killer in any quest for widespread public affection. After he first became governor, a major piece in what the Christie camp thought to be their route to bigger things was a calculated marketing of their guy via his famous town hall meetings across the state. That the much touted videos of these "performances" invariably included boorish and/or insulting Christie putdowns of common or garden variety Jersevites evidently contributed, in the view of the Christie promoters, to how special the governor was. In the real world we watched, dumbstruck, these recurring poor-taste displays. And we knew full well that the idea of offering this unseemly stuff as prelude to a presidency could only come from wackos.

The Rutgers poll reported that 20 percent of respondents cited Christie's personality as an important factor framing their negative rating for the governor. Respondents were quoted as having used terms like "arrogance," "rudeness" and "abrasive" in forming their judgments. We don't know whether either in the earlier elected position of county legislator or later in the role of U.S. Attorney for New Jer-



sey, to which George W. Bush appointed him, Christie demonstrated the churlishness that would be so front and center as governor. Perhaps by the time of his run for governor in 2010, anti-Jon Corzine (the incumbent) sentiment was so deep-seated with the electorate, it trumped any off-color vibe Christie emitted. Whatever, Christie certainly seems to have found his assumption of gubernatorial office a dandy time, if not before, to unleash the full personality package.


It bordered on surreal. Christie in full flight, via those town hall videos, might give us a "Shut up and sit down" leveled at some poor slob wishing to engage the governor about some matter. We might hear him tell a questioner that where the governor's children went to school was none of her business. We might see the guv get hot under the collar or on

his high horse when someone attempted to raise an issue, maybe already making news, about which any resident of the state was perfectly entitled to inquire. Or we might see Christie, in town halls and elsewhere, warming to what seemed one of his favorite things – spewing remorseless hostility toward, of all people, the state's educators.

It's difficult to come up with rationale for why masterminds of the Christie marketing operation didn't see the derailment potency of these ongoing exhibitions. For that matter, it's mystifying that Christie himself, who reportedly had his eyes on a political career from quite early, would consider the patented rudeness and abrasiveness mentioned in the polling data useful assets as he charged forward. That's some major hubris, if Christie and his minions felt he had enough going otherwise to neutralize the highly toxic element in the package.

Then of course there was the Bridgegate mess. Again, one can't fathom why Christie would be convinced that his mere insistence of nonparticipation in or planning of that insidious closure of Washington Bridge lanes was enough for his accusers and the public to "move on." Folks in the very inner sanctum of his office operation being evidently involved in that episode of political dirty tricks unbeknownst to him, even if true, is hardly flattering to the governor's hands-on, take-careof-business creds. A politician hoping to take the ultimate career leap can't realistically expect to not be tarred by rivals as incompetent or worse, in the face of a Bridgegate type plot hatched right under his nose.

The crystal ball picture may not have changed with dramatic quickness after the porous nature of Christie's so-called ascent became exposed, but with time his 2016 White House viability has settled into where it rightly belongs. On the personality thing, Christie denies being a "bully" whenever that discussion comes up. And in his understanding of the term, he honestly may not think himself a bully. Just as honestly should he concede that he's definitely not presidential.

# What Obama's executive immigration order will do for you

• On Nov. 20, 2014, President Obama announced a series of executive actions to enable undocumented immigrants remain in the United States. According to USCIS, Some important highlights are:

• Extending the deferred action period and employment authorization to three years from two years, and allows young people be considered for deferred action if they:

• Entered the United States before the age of 16;

• Have lived in the United States continuously since at least Jan.1, 2010, rather than the prior requirement of June 15, 2007;

• Are of any age (removes the requirement to have been born since June 15, 1981); and satisfy all the other requirements.

Obama's executive order allows parents to request deferred action and employment authorization if they:

• Have lived in the United States continuously since Jan. 1, 2010;

• Had, on Nov. 20, 2014, a son or daughter who is a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident;

• Are not an enforcement priority for removal from the United States, under the Nov. 20, 2014.

It is very important to note that all the conditions must exist in order for the application to be successful. If an undocumented immigrant has resided in the United States for over five years and has no son or daughter who is a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident, he/ she cannot get benefit under this category. If an undocumented immigrant has a son or daughter who is a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent, but has not resided in the United States continuously since Jan. 1 2010, he/she cannot benefit from this.


It is also pertinent to note that the executive order merely gives a differed

action status and work authorizations. It does not confer or lead to Green card. The concept of deferred status has been very confusing to so many. According to Merriam Webster dictionary, the word "Deferred" means withheld for or until a stated time. It also means to postpone, put off, delay, or hold over. A deferred action status therefore enables the government to make a determination not to pursue removal or deportation of an undocumented or unlawfully present individual for a certain period of time.


Before the President Obama's announcement, illegal aliens who satisfy the requirement stated above would be required to leave the country. An individual who has been granted deferred action is eligible to receive employment authorization for the period of deferred action. Applicants will be required to go through a background check. An applicant with criminal history should speak to an attorney prior to submitting the application to avoid deportation.

line to 95 gourdes (US\$4.25) per gallon from 215 gourdes (\$4.62).

The government said the protests would damage the country's economy and create "devastating consequences for the most vulnerable people in our population."

A 28-year-old Jamaican man from the western parish of St. James was recently ordered extradited to the United States for lottery scamming activities.

U.S. prosecutors alleged Damion Bryan Barett is part of a criminal network that fleeced millions of dollars from U.S. citizens in the lottery scam.

The extradition order was handed down after Barrett waived his right to challenge his extradition.

Barrett, who was arrested recently, will stand trial on two counts of wire fraud. Each count carries a maximum prison sentence of 30 years.



The French overseas department of Martinique will become an associate member of the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS), according to an official statement released in Castries.

The St. Lucia-based OECS Commission said Martinique signed the nec-

essary agreement earlier this month, increasing the nine-member subregional grouping to 10.

"Martinique's pending membership of the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States follows a period of negotiations after the Regional Council of Martinique submitted a formal application for associate membership in the OECS with full support/endorsement of the French government," said the **OECS** Commission.

In November 2013, the Regional Assembly voted unanimously in favor of the island's membership of the OECS.

OECS Director General Dr. Didacus Jules describes as "historic" the island's pending membership of the sub-regional grouping.

# Jamaican Father of Hip-Hop

On any given day, tourists and curious individuals stop at 1520 Sedgwick Ave. in the Bronx to take selfies and snap photos of the façade of the apartment building.

At a glance, there is nothing distinctive about the 102unit, residential, high rise. But for those in the know, it is the birthplace of hip-hop.

According to Wikipedia: "in the summer of 2007, New York state officials declared 1520 Sedgwick Avenue the "birthplace of hip-hop" and nominated it to national and state historic registers."

How the landmark achieved its status is no mystery, as a matter of record, it was at that location that the "father of hip-hop" lived, honed his skill and propelled the underground sound from New York to become a worldwide phenomenon.

It all started with Jamaican immigrant Clive Campbell.

Born in Kingston, April 16, 1955, Campbell was the first of six children born to Keith and Nettie Campbell.

November 1967, at the age of 12, the family migrated to

the Bronx. Their address is now history.

Campbell attended Alfred E. Smith High School and although he did not know it, he quickly responded to a different moniker. Because he was tall, played basketball and spent a lot of time in the weight room his colleagues called him Hercules.

Although he loved the basketball court, he also loved music. Reportedly his early influence of sound-systems in Jamaica lingered causing him to develop a habit of listening to the dominant rhythm and blues of his new home-base.

From his own account, Campbell aka Hercules convinced his father to buy him a copy of James Brown's "Sex Machine."

He not only listened to the 45 rpm record, he discovered technicalities about the track that caused him to secure a second copy. He regularly purchased two copies of the same record and played them on separate turntables next to each other.

"He would play the break beat on one record then throw it over to the other turntable and play the same part. Doing this over and over, he could rock any house in N.Y."

His love for music endeared him to imitate the soundmen he saw in Jamaica.

Soon he started deejaying

in the recreation room of his building. While he played he realized that crowds on the dance floor responded most to the break section of the song.

"At this point in a song, the vocals would stop and the beat would just ride for short period," he recalled.

Inside the recreation room of his building, the self-made

deejay played music at his sister's birthday party.

In order to sustain the momentum for a longer period of time, Hercules combined portions from two records -- a smart move that dubbed him Kool and proved a defining birthing for hip hop. It was that evening Kool DJ Herc became the originator of break-beat.

# **Barbados' first** Gov. General **Dame Nita Barrow**

Dame Ruth Nita Barrow, (Nov. 15, 1916 - Dec. 19, 1995) was the first and only female Governor General of Barbados.

She was a nurse and humanitarian activist, serving as governor general from June 6, 1990 until her death. She was also the sister of Errol Barrow, first prime minister of Barbados.

Dame Nita was born in Barbados, the second of her parents' five children. Trained as a nurse, midwife and health care administrator, she held several nursing, public health and public administration jobs in Barbados and Jamaica in the 1940s-1950s.

She was a member of the Commonwealth Group of Eminent Persons that visited South Africa in 1986.

During that mission, she successfully thwarted South Africa's military restrictions, through entering the restricted area of Alexandra Township disguised in African garb and headdress, according to her biographical sketch.

Barrow studied nursing in Barbados, the Universities of Toronto and Edinburgh, and at Columbia University, New York City, according to Encyclopedia Britannia.

In 1964, she became an adviser to the World Health Organization (WHO) and rapidly gained international stature as nursing adviser (1967-71) to the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO); medical commissioner (1971-80); and a president (1983) of the World Council of Churches.

She was president (1975-83) of the World Young Women Christian Association (YWCA); health consultant (1981-86) to WHO; president (1982-90) of the International Council for Adult Education (ICAE); and Barbadian ambassador (1986-90) to the UN.

# **Coalition celebrates Garifuna-American Heritage Month**

The Bronx-based Garifuna Coalition, U.S.A., Inc. says it is collaborating with the Garifuna Afro-Latino Entertainment in celebrating the 7th Annual Garifuna-American Heritage Month in New York City.

The Coalition said the March 11 -April 12 celebration is being held in observance of the 218th anniversary of the "forcible deportation of the Garifuna people" by the British from St. Vincent and the Grenadines on March 11, 1797 and their settlement in Central America on April 12, 1797.

"Garifuna-American Heritage Month provides an opportunity to recognize the significance of Garifuna's contributions to the quality and character of life of New York City, and, through many events and activities throughout the month, for all people to gain a greater appreciation of Garifuna history and traditions, and of the role Garifuna-Americans have played, and will continue to play, in New York's society," the group said.

This year, the Coalition said it will pay tribute to the legendary Aurelio Martínez, who the group described as "the greatest international exponent of the Garifuna Culture and tradition, selected as the 2008-2009 Rolex Mentor and Protégé Arts Initiative.

"Garifuna-American Heritage Month has uplifted the Garifuna Community from obscurity to the pinnacle of recognition by raising awareness and appreciation of the Garifuna Community and its contribution to the culture and society of New York City," the group said.

"We look at 2015 as the turning point to advance the integration of the Garifuna Community of New York, with the aim of promoting its advancement and economic development," it added.

New York City is regarded as the home of the largest Garifuna population outside of Central America, with over 200,000.

In the spirit of the International Decade for People of African Descent (2015 -2024), the Coalition said it is also launching a "cultural economic development strategy around culture, creativity and sustainable development, with the aim of positioning New York City as the epicenter of the Garifuna arts and culture economy.'

# Small Orlando sandal business attracts big attention

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) \_ In a small concrete-block office in downtown Orlando, Julie Colombino — a former Cirque aerialist turned disaster-relief worker — is trying to change the world through sandals.

Colombino, 35, is surrounded by scores of them: simple, handcrafted sandals of Haitian goat leather and recycled tires \_ sandals whose creation has caught the attention of both the United Nations and New York fashion mogul Kenneth Cole.

He's now selling them.

"It's crazy," Colombino says. "When I started, I never fathomed it would be like this."

In January 2010, a week and a half after a catastrophic 7.0 earthquake struck Haiti, Colombino left her Winter Park home and caught a flight to the epicenter of the disaster. An estimated 160,000 people were dead; two million people were newly homeless.

She soon found herself sta-

tioned in a first-aid camp, irrigating gaping wounds and handing out expired Tylenol to those who really needed morphine.

"I had no medical expertise, and we had no real pain medication to give them," she says.

At times, surrounded by the sights, sounds and stench of agony, it was all she could do not to pass out.

Yet a month into her mission \_ a month of sleeping in a tent, sometimes without fresh water or food, each night worrying she would be raped \_ she returned to Central Florida only to resign from her job, sell her belongings and take her \$7,000 in life savings back to Haiti.

"I know it sounds lofty," she says, "but the truth is that I was just called to it."

"Julie is fearless," says Robert Brown, president and CEO of the Heart of Florida United Way, where Colombino worked a day job. "I mean, she used to swing on those curtains they have at Cirque. I figured if she could

do that, she could do just about anything."

Those initial, chaotic months are now largely a blur, save for one lasting impression: Once people moved beyond the basics of food, water and medical care, what they wanted most was a job. Even before the earthquake, Haiti was the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere.

In the devastated capital of Port-au-Prince, Colombino used her tiny nest egg to hire four Haitian workers and launch REBUILD Globally, a nonprofit, in a lean-to covered by a tarp. Together, the five would sit on the floor, using razor blades to cut sandal soles from discarded tires that would otherwise be burned as rubbish.

"They were horrendous," Colombino says of the early results. "They were heavy and ugly. But we were really proud of them, and people were actually starting to buy them, which blew our minds."

They sold for \$20 a pair, mostly to foreign aid workers.



Colombino then hired a Haitian cobbler to train her workers on the finer points of shoemaking, and with each prototype, the sandals grew more attractive and comfortable. A team from Nike showed them how to incorporate arch support, and, in 2012, the United Nations team in Haiti granted REBUILD \$30,000 to hBut the operation has never been just about selling sandals. In Haiti, REBUILD's social enterprise

is considered revolutionary. Colombino's organization pays the workers a decent salary an average of 225 percent above the Haitian minimum wage of \$5.11 a day — allowing them to buy their own homes and, often, to "adopt" their own children back from orphanages. Many of the parents, Colombino learned, had been forced by extreme poverty to surrender their sons and daughters to someone who could feed and shelter them.



# **Inequality fuels HIV epidemic** in the Caribbean

ST. JOHN'S, Antigua, Feb. 10, 2015 (IPS) - At 49 years old, Edison Liburd has established himself as one of Antigua and Barbuda's most recognisable artists. But Liburd was not always in the spotlight. In fact, you could say he was a man in hiding.

"I have been infected with the HIV virus for about 24 years. I got my first HIV test done in February of 1993 at the Allen Pavilion Hospital in Manhattan New York," Liburd told IPS.

"I can remember that day vividly. I felt like the earth had been removed from beneath me when I was handed the results of the test."

HIV/AIDS first emerged in the 1980s, and now, more than three decades later, stigma associated with the disease has persisted. Liburd pointed to that sigma as the main reason why he concealed his HIV status for as long as he did.

"I hid my status for years from family. I told a few friends, but most people who I knew did not know anything about my health condition. It was fear of being ostracised that kept me from disclosing my status," he said.

"In Antigua, HIV infected individuals

still have to face job insecurity - first to be fired and last to be hired. Stigma and discrimination is still high because many still think themselves superior to individuals who are infected.

"Somehow they think themselves better than, but I believe that it is when infected individuals become empowered by taking hold of their health and indispensable to nation building that this will take a huge bite out of discrimination. People will begin to see you differently," Liburd said.

The Caribbean is one of the most heavily affected regions in the world, with adult HIV prevalence about one percent higher than in any other region outside sub-Saharan Africa.

The HIV pandemic in the Caribbean is fuelled by a range of social and economic inequalities and is sustained by high levels of stigma, discrimination against the most at-risk and marginalised populations and persistent gender inequality, violence and homophobia.

centrated in and around networks of men who have sex with men. Social stigma, however, has kept the epidemic among men who have sex with men hidden and unacknowledged. There is also a notable burden of infection among injecting drug users, sex workers and the clients of sex workers.

The main mode of transmission in the Caribbean is unprotected heterosexual intercourse - paid or otherwise. Sex between men is also thought to be a significant factor in several countries, although due to social stigma, this is mainly denied.

The level of stigma and discrimination suffered by those infected and affected by the virus in the Caribbean helps drive the epidemic underground. This makes it difficult to reach many groups.

After facing the worst of his fears, being hospitalised and getting close to death's door, Liburd has "resolved to fight back against the discrimination by increasing my capacity to help others in every way through my gift of art and my voice on and in the media, in church and otherwise.

"This has really been a powerhouse for HIV in the Caribbean is mostly con- me. I have become more confident and

bold when faced with opposition. It has and is still more than ever being a source of inspiration and encouragement for many who hear my story, both infected and non-infected alike."

Executive director of the Antigua and Barbuda HIV/AIDS Network (ABHAN), Eleanor Frederick, said individuals living with HIV face many challenges such as unemployment, homelessness, and in some cases, they are abandoned by their families.

# Leading community figure passes at age 70

Selwyn Cumberbatch, a leading Vincentian community figure in New York and a former staff sergeant in the Royal St. Vincent and the Grenadines Police Force, died on Feb. 9. He was 70.

Relatives did not state the cause of death but said Cumberbatch, originally from Richmond Hill, Kingstown, the Vincentian capital, was "engaged to be married on September 2015 to Barbara Capers, of New York."

Cumberbatch, affectionately known as "Compo" - who migrated to New York in 1980 with his late wife, the former Elva Alves - had resided in Brooklyn ever since "and soon became an icon in the community," relatives said.

He was a member of - and supported - many Vincentian and Caribbean organizations in the New York metropolitan area, relatives said.

Cumberbatch was a former president of the Brooklyn-based

St. Vincent and the Grenadines the Grenadinesl." Ex-Police Association of New York, Inc. and the Council of St. Vincent and the Grenadines' Organizations, U.S.A., Inc. (COSAGO), the umbrella Vincentian group in the United States, which is also based in Brooklyn. Additionally, up to his death, he was a lay speaker at St. Mark's United Methodist Church in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn.

Parishioners said he officiated at the church's worship service the day before he died.

Relatives said Cumberbatch had "an extensive career" in the Royal St. Vincent and the Grenadines Police Force, where he also served as a detective and "person-in-charge at the Windward district in Biabou.

"There, many still [who] revere him as the person instrumental in establishing the soccer league," said relatives, stating that he was an "outstanding long distance runner in his vouth, and excelled in cricket and soccer in St. Vincent [and

Cumberbatch began his career in New York as a security officer at the then Manufacturers Hanover Trust bank, now Chase Bank, while pursuing a degree in banking at Pace University.

Relatives said he "survived" several banking mergers, finally retiring in 2011 from the Bank of New York Mellon.

He inspired his children and grandchildren to achieve degrees in chemical engineering, accounting, finance, business administration, sociology, criminal justice, marketing and development administration, relatives said.

In devoting his spiritual life to St. Mark's United Methodist Church, relatives said Cumberbatch "spent countless hours in private study of the scriptures.

"He became in fixture at Wednesday night meetings and regular church service," they said. "More than anything else, Selwyn excelled in fellowship." "He had a knack for extend-

ing himself to all, with great charisma, charm, a quick wit and extreme dedication," they added. "You can count on him to prepare [ing] food, supporting events [and] lend [ing] personal assistance."

He "just made everyone feel beloved, no matter the occasion," relatives continued. "His smile and kindness will survive him into all eternity. He will be missed by all."

Cumberbatch – who was born on Dec. 15, 1944 to the late Vincent and Mary Cumberbatch, of Richmond Hill was the father of five: Colin, La-Ferne, Petrona, Laurie and Curtis (who predeceased him).

His siblings include Kenrick, Noel, Brian, Bertram, Leroy (deceased) and his only sister, Yvonne.

# Trinidadian expat Horace L. Morancie succumbs

A pall fell on the city Tuesday, Feb. 4 with news of the death of Horace L. Morancie.

The painful reality of the passing of the 85-year-old, Trinidad & Tobago expatriate resonated with nostalgia as Brooklyn residents recalled the relentless effort made by the immigrant who dedicated time and effort to the improvement of housing conditions of less privileged city dwellers.

"He was one of the most powerful technocrats of the 60's and 70s," Herman Hall, publisher of Everybody's Magazine said.

According to the Caribbean documenter of historic achievements, Morancie worked tirelessly "during the civil rights era of the 1960s when white liberal political leaders in New York City sought to place qualified Blacks in high profile administrative positions."

At the time, President Lyndon B. Johnson banked on advancing his war on poverty campaign. With support for the anti-poverty plan, the city's then Mayor John Lindsay, a Republican chose Morancie, a fellow party supporter to tackle social issues in the borough and primarily the urgency of

residents living in Central Brooklyn's Bedford-Stuyvesant community.

Morancie reportedly met the criteria both academically and politically.

Educated at Brooklyn Polytechnic University, Harvard University, Kennedy School of Government, Cornell University and Brooklyn Law School he qualified for an appointment to lead the charge in Brooklyn for reform of housing conditions. Soon afterwards, he was named director of the Model Cities Program, the principal advocacy agency for fair and affordable housing, improved social services, sports and culture.

Morancie's accomplishments and reputation became a positive for the party so much so that he was chosen to rival the almost-invincible Shirley Chisholm, a strong Democratic candidate.

Allegedly, T&T Prime Minister Eric Williams was enamored by his countryman's dedication to improving the lot of others and on occasion encouraged Morancie to return to his birthplace to contribute with nation building of the newly-independent republic. In addition to advocating for the needy, Morancie was admired for his patriotic dedication to T&T.

And we are among the blessed of the earth because our governments are chosen, not by force, not by decree, not by the whim of any force or interest, but by the will of the people."

"I shall forever cherish having been given the opportunity to lead the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis," Douglas added. "The elections are now over, and although we still await the announcement of the preliminary results, I wish our newly elected government well."

Meantime, the Electoral Observation Mission of the Organization of American States (OAS/EOM) in St. ner."

Kitts and Nevis, led by Ambassador Frank Almaguer, congratulated the citizens of the country for their "active participation" in the general elections.

The EOM said there was high voter ed "civil and peaceful exercise of their franchise on Election Day."

The Mission, however, noted that the counting and transmission of results was "extremely slow, stemming from a series of procedural difficulties."

"More than 12 hours after the closleading to speculation and uncertainty among Kittitians and Nevisians," it said, adding that the delay in the dissemination of results was related to two main issues.

First, it said counting started late due to instructions given to returning officers with regard to the transportation of the ballot boxes of the early voting, carried out on Feb. 14 for essential services personnel and security forces.

Second, the Mission said challenges were presented during the counting process, and that some of the results were being contested.

But despite the problems encountered after the closing of the polls, the EOM said it was pleased to observe that in general, Election Day was carried out in an "orderly and pacific man-

Candidates for awards of Jamaica's annual national civil honors are urged to submit nomination forms in order to meet the March 13 deadline set by the Jamaica Consulate for appointments to the Order of Merit, the Order of Jamaica, the Order of Distinction - in the rank of commander class (CD) and officer (OD).

Individuals interested in seeking consideration for the island's highest national honors must act quickly to complete the guidelines set for the 2015 presentation.

Along with the top three honors, awards of the badge of honor for gallantry, meritorious service and for long and faith service entitles Jamaicans and foreignborn nominees worthy of recognition to apply for consideration.

Conferred by the governor general with advice from the prime minister of the island, the prestigious honors can be conferred posthumously to any individual of distinction that has achieved excellence in the field of arts, science, literature or any other endeavor distinguished.

If the nominee is a citizen of



a country other than Jamaica, the government of Jamaica is required to obtain the approval of the relevant commonwealth or foreign government prior to the awards of any order of decoration to the nominee.

In order to present a total description of the nominee and also aid in adding pertinent information that could enhance the selection process, a current biographical outline should accompany the submission.

One of the principal details should include valuable service to the island that could be considered worthy of recognition.


Roberts said the two sections "Fly Jamaica Airways" and "Honest Illusions" would emphasize the way change takes place through the natural environment and in life.

# Fetish flick fails to match erotic best-seller hype

"Fifty Shades of Grey" marked the remarkable writing debut of TV executive-turnedromance novelist Erika Mitchell. Publishing under the pen name E.L. James, the British author has enjoyed unparalleled success, selling over 100 million copies worldwide in just a few years.

Her erotic thriller chronicles the kinky relationship of a college coed and a handsome, young billionaire with a sordid sexual appetite for sadomasochism. Unfortunately, this relatively-tame screen version, directed by Sam Taylor-Johnson (Nowhere Boy), teases more than it titillates, as it devotes plenty of time build up

prior to petering out in terms of delivery.

At the point of departure, we meet vestal virgin Anastasia Steele (Dakota Johnson) as she's about to drive from Vancouver to Seattle to the

corporate headquarters of Grey Enterprises to interview CEO Christian Grey (Jamie Dornan) for her college newspaper. The English major's only been allotted 10 minutes with the busy captain of industry slated to deliver the keynote commencement address at her school's upcoming graduation.

Upon being introduced, obviously intimidated Ana awkwardly asks "To what do you owe your success" and "Are you

gay?" before her subject confesses to being a control freak. Turning the tables, Christian proceeds to pose probing personal questions to the nervous journalist, as a palpable sexual tension between the two starts to simmer just beneath the surface.

He reveals his fondness for a particular fetish, however nothing is consummated for a long stretch. Instead, the first half of the film is devoted to a frustrating Kabuki dance where foreplay invariably leads to coitus interruptus.

In lieu of the whips, chains and other staples of bondage debauchery, we're treated to cautious exchanges during which a whimpering, wideeyed Ana repeatedly says how scared she is of Christian while he insists she sign a non-disclosure agreement allowing him to torture her. Yes, they eventually do get around to entering his dungeon but, by then, their bland, anticlimactic sessions prove to be a classic case of too little-too late.

A monochromatic misfire featuring only one shade: blushing pink.






