CARICOM UNDER REVIEW

Jamaica wants to assess its relationship with the group

Caribbean Community leaders meeting in Guyana from Monday are to have an extensive discussion on the implications of Britain's impending exit from the European Union but even as they do so, one of their own has made it clear that just like the Brits. the time has come for it to review its own relations with the regional family.

In mid June, Jamaican Prime Minister Andrew Holness, leader of the Jamaica Labor Party (JLP), established a CARICOM Review Commission largely because the island of about three million people is dissatisfied with trading arrangements in the group of 15 nations, especially mechanisms to settle trade and immigration disputes.

The moves came in the midst of a simmering and years-old row between Trinidad and Jamaica over what Jamaica says, is the lopsided level of trade between the two countries as well as the 'nasty habit' of Trinidadian immigration officers denying entry of Jamaican nationals to the country, single, young females in particular.

The allegation has much to do with sad tales from victims Continued on Page 14

City Council passes resolutions for Haitian Day

New York City Council has unanimously passed resolutions tabled by Haitian-born Council Member Dr. Mathieu Eugene calling on New York State and the United States to recognize the contributions Haitians have made in the U.S. by establishing a Haitian Day.

Resolution 687 establishes Oct. 9 which signifies the Battle of Savannah, when Haitian soldiers fought for freedom with the United States — annually as New York City Haitian Day, in recognition of the historic contributions of the Haitian Diaspora to the City of New York.

Resolution 664 calls on the United States Congress and the New York State Legislature to pass — and the president of the United States and governor of the State of New York to sign — legislation

Day in recognition of the historic contributions of Haitians to the United States

"We are lucky to live in one of the most diverse places in the world. The character of New York has been shaped by so many different cultures and, since the beginning of American history, Haiti has helped shape this great nation," said Eugene, who represents the largely Caribbean 40th Council District in Brooklyn.

"My resolutions illustrate how the contributions of Haitians have made an impact in New York City, as well as the United States, he added. "Haitians are architects, lawyers, doctors, authors, musicians, and involved in every vocation possible, and together, we have made tremendous contributions to American art, medicine, law, to establish Oct. 9 annually as Haitian culture, and most importantly, the his-

tory of the nation."

Eugene, the first Haitian to be elected to New York City Council said, notably. Haitian soldiers helped the United States fight for its freedom at the Battle of Savannah in 1779.

He said Chicago was founded by Haitian Jean Baptiste Point du Sable; and the Louisiana Purchase, which nearly doubled the amount of land owned by the United States, was only made possible because of the revolution in Haiti, led by Toussaint L'Ouverture.

In New York, Eugene said Haitian Pierre Toussaint was an early 1800s philanthropist, "who dedicated his life to helping others," stating that Pierre Toussaint was the founder of a Manhattan orphanage and helped pay for children's schooling, and that he also donated money to build Old St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Caribbean

The Caribbean Community (CARI-COM) says it is closer to setting up a labor market information system for

the Caribbean Single Market and Economy (CSME) after the 15-member grouping signed a memorandum



of understanding (MoU) with the International Labor organization (ILO).

The CARICOM Secretariat said in a statement that the MoU allows CARI-COM member states to utilize a software tool developed by the ILO for the facilitation of labor markets analysis and other related functions.

The software, called Stat, was first presented by the ILO at a recent global consultation hosted by the CARICOM Secretariat in October 2015.

The Secretariat said that coming out of subsequent meetings with member states, it was decided that the software tool was appropriate for setting up a CARICOM Labor Market Information System (LMIS).

The MoU authorizes CARICOM and its member states to use the software free of charge for the implantation of the LMIS both nationally and regionally.

Antigua

Antigua and Barbuda Prime Minister Gaston Browne said he had assets of

EC\$30 million before he came into office and has dismissed allegations that he had accepted more than



\$20,000 in bribes since he became leader of the Antigua Labor Party two years ago.

Speaking in parliament during the debate on legislation to abolish personal income tax, Browne said apart from one other politician, there is no other parliamentarian who would have come into government with the wealth he brought in 2014.

Browne revealed that he had declared more than EC\$30 million in assets to the Integrity Commission when he took up his position as prime minister.


He said a significant portion of his wealth included real estate assets throughout the island, heavy equipment as well as trucks and his involvement in rental cars for many years."

Browne said he was now in process of transferring most of interest to family members and since coming to office he acquired only one property.

Barbados

Barbados has by-passed Trinidad and Tobago and is importing liquefied natural gas (LNG) at double the price from the USA, according to a report by the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of ers of the Guyana Geology and Mines

The report, which tracks LNG import and export data for the U.S. for the first four month of the year, shows five shipments of US LING left Florida between Feb. 5 and April 29 bound for Barbados.

The shipments totaled 7.4 million cubic feet of LNG and fetched prices as high as US\$15.78 per million British thermal units (mmbtu), with the lowest price being US\$10 per mmbtu.

The highest price T&T has fetched for LNG exports to the US this year was US\$6.70 mmbtu. According to



the report Trinidad and Tobago is now the only country in the world that exports LNG to the US.

Guyana

The Guyana government says it has indisputable evidence that Venezuelan soldiers had fired shots at several offic-

Commission (GGMC) late last month.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a statement: "The Venezuelan authori-

ties would have done well to check with the troops in question at the observation post, La Boca, on Anoko

island, who had fur-

nished Guyana's investigators with an explanation, which the government of Guyana believes and which it has found to involve unacceptable behavior because it assumed it had rights of policing the river."

Caracas, which continues to lay claim to the Essequibo region, has denied the allegation that its soldiers fired upon the GGMC officials during the incident on May 30.

But Georgetown, in its statement recently said; "The statement, which the government of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela has chosen to release to the media, flies in the face of direct reports which the authorities of Guyana

received from the victims as well as the explanation which the representatives of Guyana's military received on May 31 from the Venezuelan corporal-in charge of the six troops who were involved in the incident."

The David Granger government said as a result it is rejecting Venezuela's assertion that the reported incident was part of an "international media campaign" and "an international effort to destabilize Venezuela."

Jamaica

Jamaica recorded a total of 1.5 million stopover and cruise ship visitors for the first quarter of this year.

Tourism Minister Edmund Bartlett made this disclosure during his contribution to the 2016/2017 Sectorial Debate in the House of Representatives recently.

He said that for the winter period, January to April 2016, Jamaica recorded a total of 773,458 stopover visitors and 745,220 cruise ship

arrivals amounting to 1,518, 678 visitors overall. This, he said, represents a 7.6 per cent



increase over the same period for 2015 when Jamaica welcomed 756,463 stopover visitors and 654,564 cruise passengers, totaling 1,411,027.

Bartlett further noted that, this year the ministry has been successful in increase airlift to Jamaica and had secured adequate seats to ensure a good winter and a successful summer.

In 2015 revenues from the stopover and cruise visitors totaled US\$2.5 billion.

St. Kitts

The government of St. Kitts and Nevis and Taiwan recently signed an agreement of bilateral cooperation. The two countries have long-standing diplomatic ties.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, Resident Ambassador of Taiwan, George Gow Wei Chiou, described the occasion as "very important for the relationship between St. Kitts and Nevis and the Republic of Taiwan."

The ambassador explained that

according to the agreement, Taiwan will provide monetary grants to the Federation annually for a period of four



years, adding that after that period, the agreement may be extended "according to a consensus of both countries.'

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Mark Brantley said St. Kitts and Nevis and the Republic of China on Taiwan have developed a relationship built on a strong foundation.

for more than 35 years.

The awardees were as diverse as the prism of cultures pulsating through their ancestral lands, representing a healthy cross-section of the Caribbean's more than 700 islands, islets, reefs, and cays, and hailing from Antigua, Barbados, and Cayman Islands, among other isle nations.

All of them were following in the footsteps of their pioneering forbears, including Jamaican microbiologist and pathologist Louis Grant [1913–1993] who helped to isolate the deadly dengue virus, and compatriot Mary Seacole [1805-1881] who brought her mother's herbal remedies to the Crimean War's battlefields, self-financing her trip to the Black Sea peninsula to treat wounded soldiers after being passed over by Florence Nightingale.

Their combined efforts were a dose of greatness for New York, according to Community News Group's publisher.

"The Caribbean community is a large and integral part of our city's healthcare system — from nurses to doctors to home healthcare workers to administrators — and it is safe to say our world-class healthcare system would be a far lesser system

Advance directives: A first step — but not enough

My grandmother died feeling betrayed, frightened and utterly powerless in a bleak hospital room. She'd completed an advance directive about her end-of-life goals, preferences and values, including a do not resuscitate order (DNR). But when an emergency landed her in the hospital, the emergency room team ignored her advance directive and resuscitated her back to "life" just long enough for her to realize they had ignored her documented wishes. She died shortly after being resuscitated, but not before she let the healthcare team know she was angry.

Unfortunately, my grandmother is not alone in her life ending so tragically. In conversations with supporters of the end-of-life choice advocacy organization that I work for, Compassion & Choices, I often hear similar tales of an end-oflife healthcare system that has failed to meet their needs. Furthermore, there is increasing evidence that advance directives alone are not enough to ensure that people's end-of-life goals, priorities and values are honored. Below are some of the shortcomings:

Lack of Participation: Only one in four Americans (23%) have an advance directive in place, according to a 2014 study in the American Journal of Preventive Medicine. Lack of Coordination: The dying person and healthcare proxy often have not discussed the patient's goals, preferences and values. In fact, fewer than 3 in 10 people have actually talked with their loved ones about end-of-life care, according to a survey conducted by the conversation project.

Lack of Relevance: Since advance directives are by definition written in advance — sometimes many years in advance — they often lack relevance to current events and decisions near the person's end of life.

Lack of Access: It is an alltoo-common scenario that the advance directive along with the DNR order is locked away in a desk or safe when a life-threatening emergency arises, leaving family members and medical providers unsure whether an advance directive even exists.

Lack of Enforcement: Doctors are not held accountable for following advance directives. Until they are enforced, physicians are unlikely to follow them because they are trained to do everything possible to keep a terminally ill person alive, regardless of whether the treatment only prolongs an agonizing dying process.

Federal policymakers need to address the growing demand for reform by passing legis-Continued on Page 12

Brexit — Perceptions and repercussions in the Americas

MIAMI, June 27, 2016 (IPS) - The hopes of many of those who confidently expected the British electorate to vote, by a slender margin, for the country to remain in the EU have been dashed. All that is left to do now is to ponder the causes and background of this regrettable event, and consider its likely consequences, especially for relations with the United States.

In the first place one must point out and — and this is a general criticism of the present British political system — that Prime Minister David Cameron was hugely irresponsible to steer his country into this risky adventure. It has resulted in the worst calamity to befall Britain in the last half century and has inflicted severe damage not only on the EU but also on all the countries of the North Atlantic rim.

try for his Conservative Party for the next several years. Next he pursued a surrealist referendum campaign agenda, seeking to persuade the public to vote to remain in the EU, against the Brexit proposal that he himself had engineered. He relied on the advantages and special privileges promised to the UK by the EU if the British people voted to remain.

Brussels had already warned that the EU would not grant Britain any further concessions or benefits over and above the conditions that apply in common to all EU members. It pointed out that Britain was in fact already a privileged partner, having opted out of the common currency (the euro) under a special agreement that did not even fix a timescale for its putative future membership of the euro area.

London also retains full control of Britain's borders, having declined to sign the innovative Schengen Agreement which abolished many internal borders and introduced passport-free movement across the 26 Schengen countries.

The EU has indeed done

everything in its power to keep the UK government and people happy and flaunting their prized British exceptionalism.

And now the fateful moment is at hand. The effect on Europe has been devastating. The one possible advantage for the EU - which has discreetly remained unvoiced - is that of ridding itself of an awkward partner, a dinner guest with an unfortunate habit of drawing attention to itself in negative ways. Britain slammed the brakes on progress towards fuller European integration and was a temptation to other recalcitrant EU countries to follow its bad example.

Recently concerns were raised in Washington over the Brexit referendum.

President Barack Obama himself did his best to urge Britons to stick with the EU when he visited London in April.

Cameron, and the people who voted for the UK to leave the EU, have done Obama a disservice. Britain's image in the United States will deteriorate to unprecedented depths. The vaunted special relationship between the U.S. and Britain will no longer be an effective force underpinning one of the strongest alliances in recent history.

The first victim of the debacle may be the approval process for the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP) between the United States and the

Stopping the cycle of poverty in the Caribbean

UNITED NATIONS, June 22, 2016 (IPS) - Latin America and the Caribbean countries have experienced historic economic and social transformation in recent years. This has led to a considerable reduction in poverty and inequality and to advances in closing gender, labor and education gaps. These achievements are the result of a favorable economic environment as well as proactive social inclusion policies.

Despite this, 25 million to 30 million people risk falling back into poverty — a third of all those who left poverty behind during the last decade. The most vulnerable are the newly employed, women and workers in the informal sectors of the economy. Many face social exclusion that cannot be resolved with higher income, such as discrimination due to ethnic or racial group, skin color, sexual identity, migrant status or disability. from those that prevent them from falling back. The former are strongly associated with employment and returns on education — especially in urban areas. But to boost resilience and prevent setbacks four

This week the UN Development Programme (UNDP) launched its flagship regional publication, the Human Development Report for Latin America and the Caribbean. The report, Multidimensional Progress: Wellbeing beyond income, proposes new metrics and new ways to act now to protect the social and economic achievements of the past decade and remove barriers that prevent lifting more people from poverty. This includes what we call "hard exclusions", which go beyond income to factors like gender, race, ethnic group, sexual orientation and disability.

How do we move forward from here?

First, by recognizing that factors that push people away from poverty are different

from falling back. The former are strongly associated with employment and returns on education — especially in urban areas. But to boost resilience and prevent setbacks four factors are essential: access to social protection (such as pensions), access to care systems (especially for children and older persons, to level out incentives for women's participation in the labor force), having physical and financial assets (such as owning a bank account, a home, a motorbike or a car that act as 'cushions' when crisis hits), and better labor skills.

Second, by addressing hard exclusions that are not related to income. More than closing 'gaps' in access to services, these exclusions speak of a citizenship deficit: discrimination due to one's identity, lifestyle, disability or skin color. Being a woman, of African descent, indigenous, LGBTI, youth, a person with disabilities... all

of this affects opportunities, the possibility of social and economic mobility and access to services.

Given these deficits, we must advance equal opportunity and affirmative action policies. Quotas to increase the number of women in parliament are a successful example of this approach. Other examples are the innumerable advances in recognition of collective rights, political autonomy and land/territory of indigenous peoples and communities in our hemisphere.

Our report reveals that Latin

America and the Caribbean women work three times more at home (unpaid work) than men. And they earn less in the labor market, despite studying more than their male counterparts.

Demographic trends and the absence of care services (especially for children and older persons), restrict better participation of women in the labor market and families' income generation. Moreover, a third of all women and girls face sexual violence at least once in their lives.

European Union, which is already looking shaky, at least for the immediate future.

The TTIP was meant to replicate the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP), an ambitious deal to cut trade barriers, set labour and environmental standards and protect corporate intellectual property. The TPP was signed in principle by twelve Pacific Rim countries including the United States, and now awaits approval by legislators in each of the countries.

The rise of populism and anti-free trade sentiment is reflected in speeches by both U.S. presidential candidates, and is likely to slow down what is now viewed as "excessive globalisation." There is a return to a style of nationalism that exerts control over economic as well as political initiatives.

The next U.S. president will find it difficult to advance their country's alliance with London on defence issues. The UK will have freed itself from what was already problematic military cooperation with Europe, and only its link with the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) will endure. Some European NATO partners will be cautious about developing joint operations with a fellow member they view as uncommitted to agreements within the EU.

In the matter of trade per se, Washington will not take kindly to the new position of the City of London once it has lost its enviable status as a financial hub embedded in the EU. Siren songs from other European capitals solidly anchored in the soon-to-be expanded European community will be hard to resist, especially if European leaders adopt policies to strengthen the euro zone.

In Latin America, Brexit will be read as a confirmation that supranational practices and thoroughgoing integration are no longer a priority for the UK. The referendum result sends the message that national sovereignty is now paramount. All the time and effort the EU has spent over the years to promote the advantages of the European model of integration, based on the strength of its treaties and the effectiveness of its institutions, will be regretted as a sheer waste of time and energy.

An alternative "model of integration" based on the U.S. agenda, favouring one-off arrangements or treaties limited in scope exclusively to trade issues, will prevail over the already weakened European model.

The Caribbean region has strong historical and cultural ties to Britain. It will suffer from a less secure bond with the UK and will incline more closely to Washington.

The continent of the Americas, which is closest to Britain from the point of view of history and culture as well as in political and economic terms, will thus find itself further apart from Europe than before.

lation that advances the delivery of person-centered care. A good first step would be for Congress to pass the bipartisan Care Planning Act (S. 1549), sponsored by Senators Mark Warner (D-VA) and Johnny Isakson (R-GA). The legislation would require providers to include prominently in the patient's medical record the content of an advance directive. In addition, the bill gives patients the option of signing a "portable treatment order" to give providers specific instructions about patient preferences in receiving care. Medicare-certified providers would be obliged to comply with these orders in any care setting, including the home, that could stop unnecessary and unwanted medical treatments.

The bill also would require Medicarecertified healthcare providers to comply with a patient's verbal and nonverbal treatment instructions. When a patient lacks decisional capacity, the provider must adhere to a patient's advance directive. In the absence of a directive issued in the state where care is being provided, the provider must respect an advance directive signed by the patient in another state to facilitate the ease and adherence to advance directives across state lines.

If the Care Planning Act had been in effect when my grandmother was dying, it would have increased the likelihood that her end-of-life wishes were honored. It's too late to help her now, but it is not too late to pass this legislation to ensure that we honor the end-of-life wishes of millions of Americans in the future.

who are denied landing that they are perceived as intended prostitutes, willing drug mules or women headed to the oil and gas-rich nation seeking Trini husbands and citizenship eventually.

Holness named his mentor and the man who made him head of government and the party, former PM Bruce Golding, to head up the commission even as he went out of his way to assure neighbors and skeptics that Jamaica is not about to undertake a"Jaxit" and leave CARICOM ,which it had helped to found back in July of 1973.

"One of the lessons that we have learnt from the recent referendum in the UK is that governments must pay keen attention to what their citizens are saying," he told a launch ceremony of the commission on Tuesday.

"There is clearly in Jamaica, a perception of CARICOM, and the solution which I believe works for us is to investigate that, to create the forum in which those views can be given voice (and) the issues articulated, but that there are persons who can give context, direction, interpretation, lead opinion, analyze and chart a course forward. That's

the approach that I intend to take, to get the expert opinions to interface, interact, exchange the views with the Jamaican people as to where it is we want to go."

The JLP has been perennially lukewarm on things CARICOM, with the party opposing Jamaica ditching the British Privy Council and joining the Trinidad-based Caribbean Court of Justice, the final appeals court for criminal and civil cases in CARICOM. Most nations have not yet joined up. Jamaica was also instrumental in the break up of the colonial era West Indies Federation shortly after formation at the close of the 1950s.

"We cannot pre-empt what the commission will say, but it was never the intention to lay any groundwork, or chart any path out of CARICOM.

and we are grateful to the Rent Guidelines Boards for listening," DeJesus added. "But we will continue the fight to repair years of exorbitant rent increases and to protect New York City's affordable housing.'

While the rent freeze on one-year rents last year was historic, data shows that landlords have been overcompensated by high rent increases during the Bloomberg years, the coalition said.

With the high amount of rent burden on New York's most vulnerable tenants and serious wage stagnation, the coalition called for a rent rollback.

The coalition, along with elected officials and tenants from all over the city, rallied and made their voices heard at each of the RGB's public hearings.

The RGB regulates rents for the more than one million rent-stabilized apartments in New York City.

"On June 29, 2015 the RGB made a historic decision to pass the proposal of a one-year rent freeze for rent-stabilized tenants, and tonight they made the decision to freeze rents again for another year," the coalition said.

D. Williams, representative for the the Rent Justice Coalition for their 45th Council District, said while the advocacy," Kallos added.

RGB's decision was not the rent rollback that many working class New Yorkers have sought and needed, tenants should still feel empowered.

"For two historic years, this Board has asked the question of 'whether there should be an increase?' before they asked the question of 'how much?" he said.

"The answer this year, at least for one type of lease, was thankfully no," Williams added. "I want to encourage everyone to remain vigilant and continue to advocate to make New York City truly affordable for its residents.

Fortunately, because of the leadership of groups like the Urban Justice Center, this fight will continue," he continued.

Williams's City Council colleague Ben Kallos said the rent freeze will extend relief to tenants throughout the city who have struggled to keep up with rising rents for years.

"The Rent Guidelines Board has shown that last 'year's rent freeze was more than a symbolic gesture, and tenants have the power to be heard," he said. "We will continue to fight to make up for years of too-high rent increases.

"Thank you to the many tenants Brooklyn Councilmember Jumaane who came out to tell their stories and

"The jerk roasted pig — and the curry shrimp was a hit, a major hit," said Jean P. Alexander, organizer and founder of the Caribbean American Center of New York.

Non-stop crowds were buying a different array of Caribbean dishes including jerk pig, stewed fish, and plenty of vegetables. Now in its second year, the fundraiser sells food to raise money for important causes such as education.

"It was a fundraiser for our back to school program," said Alexander. "We have to buy school supplies to children whose parents can't afford."

The festival raised more money than last year, according to organizers, even having guests continuing to arrive after it was over.

"We staved up until 9 o'clock and people were still coming," said Alexander. "Some more people wanted to come after 9 pm but were dead tired."

Alexander is looking forward to the third festival next year which will be more inclusive of other Caribbean foods and a name change.

"Next year we are going to call it Caribbean Food Festival," said Alexander. "We are going to have each person from one of those islands make their speciality, so it can be a nice array of Caribbean food."

"It was a very young and artistic crowd, so having them converge at the CaribBEING House, in the middle of Flatbush to celebrate Caribbean culture was the







New trauma center for East Flatbush

Members of the East Flatbush community celebrated the grand opening of the Haitian Community Council's (HCC) new trauma location with a ribbon cutting ceremony on Church Avenue on June 24.

Local politicians came to show support for the opening of the new trauma center, including council members and officials from Borough Hall. The organization, formerly located on Linden Boulevard, re-located to the heart of a neighborhood in dire need, says one councilman.

"Church Avenue is one of the most vibrant commercial areas in the city, but we've had issues here," said Councilman Jumaane Williams (D-East Flatbush).

"We've had issues with shootings all around Church Avenue. Many organizations have stepped up to plate to try to help suppress those shootings, and I know that with HCC, that success is going to continue now that we can have send some people to a place that is culturally competent."

cilman Williams, who also believes unchecked experiences will negatively impact their communities.

"If you witness violence and nobody has spoken to you about it, what do you with that trauma as you get older?" said Williams. "We know that hurt people, hurt people — so you have to help that hurt within themselves, so they won't hurt themselves or others and the community can heal."

Williams emphasized that the stigma of mental illnesses in Black communities prevented people from seeking much needed help. Representatives also stressed that HCC be inclusive to everyone, including the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender community (LGBT).

"What we're trying to do is create a LGBT community in Brooklyn, and let people know that HCC is LGBT-friendly, and that they can come here for services," said Mark Kornegay, project manager at HCC.

Other officials from HCC agreed and said that even though the center had Haitian roots, they hope their new locale attracts all of the East Flatbush community.

"Although we're a Haitian-based organization, our doors are open to everyone," said Fuljens Henry, deputy director of the Haitian Community Coalition. "And we look forward to being a staple here on Church Avenue."

Former deputy Prime Minister Phillipe Pierre has been chosen to lead the St. Lucia Labor Party (SLP) by the party's elected MPs following its defeat in the recent general election.

Pierre will also serve as opposition leader. He was endorsed as SLP leader at a recent meeting of the party's National Council.

Pierre, a former deputy prime minister is one of only six

SLP candidates to win their seats in the general elections. He succeeded former Prime Minister Dr. Kenny Anthony.

Pierre will serve as political leader until the party's next convention which is expected to be held in October or November when a leader will be elected.

St. Vincent

Public officials in St. Vincent and the Grenadines will no longer have to swear allegiance to the Queen when

taking oath of office but will instead swear to "be faithful and bear true allegiance to St. Vincent and the Grenadines."



The island's parliament recently passed an amendment bill to remove the practice of officials in St. Vin-

cent and the Grenadines swearing allegiance to the Queen.

Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves said it's not any disrespect to Queen Elizabeth 11, the country's ceremonial head of state.

Gonsalves noted that countries such as Jamaica that have the Queen as their head of state but do not swear allegiance to her.

He said there was no constitutional requirement for officials to swear allegiance to the Queen.

Trinidad

The CARCIOM Marijuana Commission has hit a stumbling block in its bid to host the first national consultation on legalization in Trinidad and Tobago as the gov-

ernment has indicated that it was "not ready", according to the Caribbean Collective for Jus-



tice, a lobby group for the decriminalization of marijuana.

Spokesman for the Group Nazma Muller said in a news release that this information was revealed by the commission when asked where the consultations were to take place.

The legislation allows a person to carry up to two ounces of marijuana without a criminal record and to grow up to five plants where permitted.



Guyanese student picks Harvard University

Seventeen-year-old Kelly Hyles is a giggly teenager, but her focus and strong determination to attend an Ivy League school, such as Yale, Princeton, Dartmouth, Cornell, Brown and Columbia is an inspirational journey to which other youth should aspire.

Just recently, this brilliant student who attends High School for Math Sci-

ence and Engineering in Harlem, received a Proclamation from Mayor Bill de Blasio for her remarkable achievements after migrating just six short years ago from her small Vryheid's Lust village in Guyana - and accepted to 20 colleges to fulfill her dream of become a neurosurgeon.

"I am honored to be in the spotlight, and to use this attention to motivate as many other students as possible because it was definitely a team effort that got me to where I am today," Hyles told this reporter at Guyana's 50th Independence Jubilee Awards ceremony at Manhattan's Surrogate's Court, recently.

"It is my obligation to help others to achieve their goals," she said, adding, "I chose Harvard University because I want to focus on bio-chemistry and neuroscience, and eventually attend medical school to become a neurosurgeon,"

The math and science buff, kick-started her career, by working many hours in the research labs at Mt. Sinai Hospital to learn of the effects of a specific genet, associated with type ll diabetes on beta cell mass, according to reports.



"I always knew where I wanted to go, and I worked very hard to get there. There will be many ups and downs, but it does not matter how many times you fall, it's how many times you get back up," were the encouraging words of Hyles who impressed upon her peers to never give up, and work towards their goals.

The A-student, whose mother, Anetta Hyles, a certified nursing assistant, works two jobs to support her, and brother, Kevon in their Brooklyn neighborhood, is the cofounder and co-president of the Black Students Union of her Math Science and Engineering High school.

Just one of a handful of black students in her senior class, Hyles said one of the goals of the student union is to encourage and show kids the way to black excellence throughout the Diaspora.

"We must change the narrative of what black kids see," said the student who views the mainstream media "as not being positive enough towards black youth."

For her steadfast determination to help other youth, Hyles collaborated with the DREAM program that prepares students for the Specialized High School Admissions Test. She also spent many hours mentoring students at her former Brooklyn middle school.

Recently named a Ron Brown Scholar, Hyles, who organizes regular meetings to promote black excellence, said the most rewarding is a "Blackout day" program — time to celebrate black culture — and finding parallels between seemingly different cultures, according to the student.

"I am confident that an aura of self-love will continue to reign in my school," she articulated.

Hyles has become an academic icon, not only in the Guyanese community, but also in her high school and Brooklyn community. Just back from a world-wind tour of her homeland where she made motivational speeches to school around the country, as part of the 50th Independence Jubilee, the teen, still finds the time to enjoy her hobbies.

" I love to dance, and I am cheer leader," said the scholar, who choreographs dance hall and Soca pieces. She also enjoys a good dish of popular Guyanese dishes such as "Pepperpot" and "Chicken Curry."

The Guyanese community is very proud of Kelly Hyles' outstanding accomplishments and wishes her well on her journey towards 'excellence."

United Nations General Assembly President Mogens Lykketoft has expressed sincere condolences to the widow, friends and colleagues of former Assembly President and ex-Antigua and Barbuda Ambassador to the UN Dr. John Ashe, who died on Wednesday, June 22. He was 61.

"Despite the many as yet unproven accusations made against him, Mr. Ashe was for many years a hard-working and popular member of the diplomatic corps in New York and at the United Nations," said Lykketoft on Thursday. "I know that his death will come as sad news to the many professional friends and colleagues he made during his time here."

Lykketoft recalled that Ashe served as General Assembly president for its 68th session — from September 2013 until September 2014 — and had since October 2015 been facing criminal charges in the United States courts related to his term as President.

Reports indicate that Ashe died suddenly on Wednesday of a massive heart attack.

The late diplomat was a key figure in the bribery case in which he and others allegedly had received bribes from Chinese billionaire Ng Lap Seng.

Ashe, Seng and another co-defendant were to appear in Manhattan Federal Court in New York on Monday.

Seng is currently under house arrest in New York.

"We wish his wife, family and friends well as they come to terms with his sudden death," said Lykketoft, referring to Ashe.

In October last year, top United Nations officials said they were "shocked" and "deeply troubled" to learn about the "very serious allegations" announced United States' federal prosecutors against Ashe.

Prior to his appointment as leader of the 68th session of the General Assembly in September 2013, Ashe had been Antigua and Barbuda's Permanent Representative to the United Nations.

BOOK REVIEW '83 Minutes' takes you through Jackson's death

"83 Minutes: The Doctor, the Damage, and the Shocking Death of Michael Jackson" by Matt Richards and Mark Langthorne c.2016, Thomas Dunne Books \$27.99 / higher in Canada 426 pages

It doesn't take very long. An accident, a murder, a surprise can happen in an instant that can seem like a lifetime. It doesn't take very long - or does it? The odd thing about time is that it's shapeable, as you'll see in the new book "83 Minutes: The Doctor, the Damage, and the Shocking Death of Michael Jackson" by Matt Richards and Mark Langthorne.

911 call came into the Ronald Reagan UCLA Medical Center in Los Angeles, medical staff had no idea they were in the middle of pop culture history. The emergency operator and the paramedics he dispatched didn't know the identity of the man they were asked to help, but they learned soon enough that their patient was Michael Jackson.

For Jackson, it had been a long, rough road to that moment.

Throughout his life, he'd survived loneliness, physical abuse, estrangement from family, accidents, and scandals. Outwardly, he was a survivor, driven, a perfectionist. Behind closed doors, though, there was something more sinister.

In the days following the making of a commercial in which Jackson so famously received scalp burns, he was understandably in pain. Doctors adminis-

On June 25, 2009, when the tered narcotics to alleviate his suffering and, consequently, Jackson became increasingly dependent on drugs. Later, he complained of insomnia, and he visited several medical providers for more, different prescriptions. He even asked for help from the doctor his children had been seeing for their allergies.

Dr. Conrad Murray was happy to oblige.

Whether Murray was officially hired to be the personal physician for Jackson's come-back tour is a matter of opinion but the authors say that Murray needed money, and assuming Jackson's care was his chosen method. That included giving the singer drugs which allowed Jackson to sleep but which fueled his addiction. It didn't take long before Jackson needed more powerful drugs, which Murray procured in large quantities.



Driving is a sensitive subject for older drivers who see being able to get behind the wheel as an opportunity to maintain their independence. But individuals need to be honest with themselves to remain safe on the road.

Older drivers must reassess their abilities

or many older drivers, driving is lights, a back-up camera, and a betmore than getting from point A to point B. Getting behind the wheel allows older drivers to remain independent, as well as mobile. But as a person ages, his risk of injury on the road increases, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Older adults and their family members need to make plans for handing dwindling skills behind the wheel and the point in time when it is no longer safe for a loved one to continue driving.

In rural and suburban communities, driving is a necessity for independent living. With limited resources available for older individuals to get around, seniors may hold onto the notion of driving longer than is safe and practical. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that in 2009 alone, 5,288 people age 65 and older were killed and 187,000 were injured in traffic accidents. Older people are involved in around 15 percent of all traffic accidents in a typical year.

Getting older doesn't mean it's time for you or a loved one to turn in your license just yet. There are ways people can come together to make the driving experience go smoothly, and it often begins with an honest conversation.

Let a loved one know you are on his side. Make sure the first topic of conversation is that it is not your intention to take away the keys of the car. Indicate that you want to work together to help keep this person behind the wheel as long as possible. Being open and honest about intentions may eliminate arguments or animosity.

Figure out safe ways to keep your loved one driving. This may include identifying a new car with upgraded safety features, such as brighter headter safety record. Enroll together in a driving safety course to brush up on driving skills.

Go for a "test drive." Family members can ride along with an older driver to get a better sense of his ability behind the wheel. If drivers have too many close calls, frequently get lost in familiar places, exhibit slower response times, or are easily distracted, this should be a wake-up call and the loved one should intervene.

Schedule a vision and hearing exam. Driving abilities can be affected by poor vision and hearing, both common side effects of getting older. Getting a senior a new eyeglass prescription or a better hearing aid may make all the difference in his driving ability.

Review prescriptions and overthe-counter medications. Many seniors take a bevy of different medications, and the side effects to these drugs could impact their driving abilities. If medications cause drowsiness or dizziness, speak with your loved one's physician about a possible alternative treatment that might make driving safer.

Be honest. If an older driver is no longer safe behind the wheel of his automobile, it is important to involve other family members and make a joint decision to remove driving privileges. Have other solutions available, such as senior busing or courtesy vans, so your loved one doesn't feel he will be confined to the house.

Dr. Alan P. Goldman: Treating And Relieving Arthritis Pain

There are a lot of people suffering with joint pain and arthritis, says **Dr. Alan P. Goldman,** a specialist in rheumatology (130 Brighton Beach Avenue, 718-946-7557), and they often believe that there is little that can be done to alleviate their pain.

They are wrong. There are many options available, Dr. Goldman says; the key is finding a physician who is knowledgeable in those treatment modalities.

As a rheumatologist, Dr. Goldman specializes in the treatment of arthritis; one of only a handful practicing in Brooklyn.

Rheumatoid arthritis is an inflammatory illness that causes joints to swell. Symptoms include morning stiffness and swelling, often in the hands, elbows, or wrists, he says. Perhaps because there are so few rheumatologists in the borough, when people experience these symptoms, they often "see a surgeon first," says Dr. Goldman. But this often doesn't make much sense, he explains.

"When you have stomach pains, you don't go to a surgeon before seeing a gastroenterologist," he explains. "When you have chest pains, you don't see a surgeon before seeing a cardiologist."

A surgeon is the expert to see when surgery is needed, he notes, and of course Dr. Goldman refers patients to surgeons when necessary. Still, Dr. Goldman believes that the majority of people who suffer with arthritis can be treated without surgery. Even those who suffer

> Patients receive these treatments once every few months, and people who previously couldn't move well find that the "benefits are tremendous," he says. Those whose symptoms are less severe may find relief with pills or injections. This method has been used successfully for many years, says Dr. Goldman. And, "It still works."

> When patients see Dr. Goldman they are assured of receiving expert evaluations. Dr. Goldman's office offers x-rays, and a number of in-office treatment procedures. Should patients need physical therapy, arrangements can be made for this, as well.

Dr. Goldman also recommends that people age 60 or older come in to be checked for osteoporosis. People who are thin or who smoke are especially at risk, he notes.

Dr. Goldman is a Harvard graduate who has studied at Bellevue Hospital-New York University Medical Center and Gouverneur Hospital in Manhattan. He is on staff at the New York Methodist Hospital, and he is a Fellow of the American College of Rheumatology, as well as a member of the American College of Physicians, Nassau County Medical Society, the New York State Medical Society, American Medical Association, and the New York



that elected representatives of both parties are now in recess until July. 5 and will soon be going off to a seven week vacation.

In order to amplify the protest perhaps, all Americans should either stage a national stand up or sit down campaign.

Already there is a chorus of voices begging that the gun-loving advocates allow every delegate and party member to pack a pistol when they attend the GOP convention in Cleveland, Ohio.

Not that there is any chance of danger or violence as the presumptive presidential party candidate Donald Trump has already assured Americans in speeches that had everyone in the Pulse Club in Orlando carried a weapon there would be far less casualties and only the gunman would be killed.

That kind of logic could best be tested from July 18-21.

While some contend that the sit-down protest was staged to appease the LGBT community, a plethora of disfranchised Americans victimized by gun violence also ponder why the gesture was not applied after a deranged maniac walked into a South Carolina church and coldbloodedly gunned down members of the congregation after they welcomed him into fellowship. Many of those also question why some or all of those same politicians neither stood nor sat after a wannabe cop working as a security guard in Florida pumped bullets into a teenager named Trayvon Martin and walked free without punishment.

That individual said he stood his ground and the young victim paid the highest price any American can ever pay, he died.

Sandy Hook, Connecticut, Columbine, Colorado, San Bernadino, California and the unknowing students and teachers at Virginia Tech only skims the surface of the now regular breaking news broadcasts that alerts each and every one of a mentally ill or enraged citizen who resorted to using gun violence against innocent people.

The anthem of peaceful resistance echoed through the halls of justice following the sit-in and it sounded just as earnest — "We Shall Overcome."

Nancy Adams (Blake Lively) was so shaken by her mother's (Janelle Bailey) untimely death that she's dropped out of med school. In order to feel closer to her dearly departed mom, she's decided to vacation at the same exotic Mexican retreat where she was reportedly conceived back in 1991. An avid surfer, she also plans to search for the stretch for her mom's favorite beach.

Upon arriving, Nancy is so impatient to find that idyllic, uncharted spot, that she impulsively heads for the ocean with her surfboard, handbag and smartphone, abandoning her bushed traveling companion at the hotel. Instead, she pod of playful dolphins as she

A couple of potential res-





The good news is that it all has been sewn together quite seamlessly yielding a thoroughly enjoyable screamfest reminding us that it's still not safe to swim in the ocean.



EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) _ Lionel Messi put his penalty kick over the crossbar, grabbed his shirt, clenched his teeth and covered his face with both hands.

A few minutes later he walked off the field, a dazed, pained look on his

bearded face. The greatest player of his generation, perhaps soccer's best ever, he was still without a title on Argentina's national team — one he says may never come.

"The national team is over for me," he told the Argentine network TyC Sports after Chile beat the Albiceleste on Sunday night for the Copa America title. "It's been four finals. It's not meant for me. I tried. It was the thing I wanted the most, but I couldn't get it, so I think it's over."

for the second straight year, 4-2 in the shootout following a 0-0 tie that ended an expanded 16-nation Copa in the United States to mark the champion-ship's 100th anniversary.

Messi, five-time FIFA Player of the Year, winner of four Champions League titles and eight Spanish La Liga crowns with Barcelona, was crushed. Much of his nation had counted on him and the top-ranked Albiceleste to bring home the nation's first major championship since 1993.

Playing two days after his 29th birthday, Messi lost a final for the third year in a row and the fourth time overall with Argentina. There was also the 2007 Copa final against Brazil, when he was still a wunderkind, and then an extra-time loss to Germany in the 2014 World Cup.

Considered alongside Brazil's Pele and Argentina's Diego Maradona as the sport's greatest, Messi won the titles at the under-20 and Olympic (under-23) levels for Argentina. But in the minds of many he needs a championship with the senior national team to solidify his place in history.

"Messi's numbers are unparalleled and I think they'll remain that way forever, because it's impossible for a football player to do what Messi has done," said Chile coach Juan Antonio Pizzi, who is from Argentina. "My generation can't compare him to Maradona — that's for my generation, because of what Maradona did for Argentine soccer. But I think the best player ever **48** Caribbean Life, July 1-7, 2016 played today here in the United States." A crowd of 82,026 filled MetLife Sta-

dium — the largest to see a soccer game in New Jersey — and many wore Messi's No. 10 jersey in Argentina's blue and white and Barcelona's navy and maroon.

Francisco Silva converted the shootout finale for the fifth-ranked La Roja after goalkeeper Claudio Bravo — Messi's Barcelona teammate — made a diving stop on Lucas Biglia's attempt.

On an ill-tempered evening that included a first-half ejection on each side and eight yellow cards, the game was scoreless through regulation and 30 minutes of extra time, with Argentina's Gonzalo Higuain missing a clear goal-scoring opportunity for the third straight final. Argentina outshot Chile 16-4 and La Roja collapsed three, four and even five defenders around Messi, then chopped down the diminutive attacker when he tried to accelerate toward the goal.

Messi, who scored five goals in the tournament, sent a free kick that Sergio Aguero nearly headed in 10 minutes into extra time, only to have Bravo jump and extend his right hand to tip the ball over the crossbar. Messi's free kick in extra time went off the wall.

Argentina goalkeeper Sergio Romero saved the opening kick by Arturo Vidal, and up stepped Messi, Argentina's captain and career scoring leader with 55 goals. He sent his shot into the stands, stunning himself, both teams and the crowd.

Javier Mascherano and Aguero made theirs, leaving the teams tied 2-2 after three rounds.

Jean Beausejour put Chile ahead, and Bravo dived to his right, saving Biglia's shot and bringing up Silva, a 30-yearold midfielder. Messi briefly pulled his jersey over his face, as if not wanting to watch. Romero dived to his left and the shot went in to his right, giving Chile another title.

Messi crouched over, as if in pain, then got up, took off his captain's armband and walked to the bench, where he was consoled by teammate Angel Di Maria. After Messi came back on the field, Aguero put a hand on one of Messi's shoulders. And new FIFA President Gianni Infantino gave Messi a pat on the back when Messi came onto the podium with his teammates for his second-place medal. Messi almost immediately took it off.

"The burden of the consecutive games (lost) has been accumulating these last two years," Argentina coach Gerardo Martino said. "He feels like you would expect a player to feel after playing and losing a final."

The tournament's average crowd of 46,119 was nearly double the 25,223 in Chile last year, and attendance will be used by the U.S. Soccer Federation as justification it deserves to host a World Cup again, likely as part of a bid for the 2026 tournament.

Brazilian referee Heber Lopes became the focus in the first half, ejecting a pair of defenders: Chile's Marcelo Diaz in the 28th minute and Argentina's Marcos Rojo in the 43rd.
